### 5.1 Public Question Time

### Thomas Hemphill, Riverside

### Statement:

Today I went for my morning walk and one section of the road is a one-way section, less than 4m wide with a high wall on one side and a steep drop on the other. And when a vehicle comes the other way, this is on Orana Place, it's bad enough squeezing into the gutter when it's a car, but when it's a large truck, it's downright dangerous. And it made me think of a couple of things.

Firstly, this narrow and dangerous road was probably built about 50 years ago. Fast forward in time, and did the council back then realise what a problem this street would be now and how difficult it is to fix?

Secondly, with the proposed development at number 46, car traffic will only get worse. Not only that, but this dodgy section of road is actually being used as an example of why it is okay to approve another dodgy access road into the new development.

We have a plan here with this development with four standards not being in compliance and requiring Council discretion. The 20% driveway access is right on the limit. The acceptable solution for doing away with pedestrian access makes no mention in the planning documents of four schools within walking distance and the likelihood of school children walking down that driveway during peak hour.

The Council's strategic plan states that its objective is that development is in keeping with the character of the area and natural values. May I ask the Council today to think of the long-term effects of its decision? This application might just tick the boxes, but does it pass the pub test? In 50 years' time, will the residents of Orana Place wonder at the wisdom of a Council decision in 2025 which created a monstrous development with permanently unfixable, difficult, and dangerous access that changed for worse the character of the area and its natural values?

### Question 1:

And my question is to Council, is how much does it take into account the character of the areas and its natural values in considering applications of this type?

### Response:

Mr. Hemphill, thank you for your statement and your question, we do take it on notice and tyou'll be responded to in the required statutory time period.

# Statement:

The driveway that we're talking about is between our properties and Mr. Hans Piatek, who's sitting there next to me. This driveway, if it ever gets built, which I doubt because of the fact that it is so arduous to build on a steep drive being 5.5 m wide, is going to leave 1 inch either side of the driveway to property boundaries, which when cars are going to meet each other in the driveway, are more than likely going to hit it or sideswipe it or run into it from an accident. Regardless of where the water's going to go when it runs down the driveway, because there'll be no gutters. This is another

issue that's going to create tension and responsibilities down the track, which I don't know if it's going to be responsible for Council or for the developer, but it's going to be an issue.

And I've since been told today now also that the garbage vehicles that were supposedly be designed to go up the driveway and pick up garbage bins from the top, which would be roughly 24 to 30 bins per fortnight, is now going to have all the bins delivered to the bottom of the street, where there is absolutely no room because there's hardly enough room for our own bins, let alone 30 more where a garbage truck's going to be going along Orana Place. And I also raised this question last time, how does Council allow an application to proceed or to be approved if there's no way that any of the vehicles can actually designedly get up the driveway to actually build these things? I mean, there won't be a garbage truck required up there because there won't be any houses. They can't get materials up there.

And they have to also jump through several more hoops before this becomes an and an ongoing concern, because they have to move a Hydro pole to do this, which Hydro have to approve, which will require consideration by at least 10 houses in the area because they're going to lose power for a period of time. Also any runoff from the road, because it's going to be a hard-packed area, the runoff water will be running through our side fences, undermining our fences and into people's backyards, because there'll be three or four times the amount of water from a hard-packed road surface.

### Question 1:

How does Council, when they assess the, this is the question, how does Council when they get their driveway application form, are they going to inform the developer that there there's no way they're going to get heavy vehicles up the driveway? There's simply not enough room to turn them, or get them out. They won't even get around the first corner in Orana Place off the highway, because of the cars parked on the side of the road, let alone turn into a 5m driveway. I mean, I'm an engineer. I know these things can't happen. It will not happen.

### Response:

Mr. Coomber, we take your statement on notice and your questions. We will find out about the rubbish arrangement, I'm not aware of that. We will take that on notice and we'll get back to you with a reply.

### Tracey Kelly, Riverside

### Question 1:

At the September meeting, Mayor Holmdahl, in response to my question, it was indicated that you had in good faith received legal advice stating that you would be covered by Council's insurance policy regarding the Code of Conduct. Additionally, Ms. Desmond noted at the meeting that the mMayor would not knowingly breach the Local Government Act. However, as reported in the Examiner on August 30, Ms. Desmond stated during the July meeting, a request for repayment of the money was made on June 20, 2025. I believe this request suggests that new advice, potentially related to the Northern Midlands case, had been provided, indicating that you would now be aware that you may not have been eligible to use the Council's insurance policy and that there was an awareness of a possible breach.

There appears to be some inconsistency in responses to my questions. One indicates legal advice was provided in good faith, which I believe gave you an unfair advantage, while another referenced a general understanding at the time that deductibles

associated with the code of conduct would be covered by Council. To my knowledge, the Act does not state this explicitly.

For the community's benefit, Mayor Holmdahl, and in good faith, could you please clarify whether the request for repayment pertained to the full cost of all legal advice or only to the deductible?

**Response**: We'll take that question on notice, Ms. Kelly, and reply to you in the required statutory time period.

**Question 2**: Following Ms. Desmond's statement at the September meeting that the current motion before council relates only to changing legislation and does not affect past actions, has the Council notified the insurance company about the error with this claim and assured them that any money paid out will be repaid in good faith?

**Response**: Again, I'll take that question on notice and you will be responded to in the required statutory time period.

Question 3: In the interest of transparency, is Council willing to provide to me a copy of the correspondence that was sent to the legal firm asking if Council's insurance policy could be used for legal advice for Mayor Holmdahl in the Code of Conduct, in spite of the fact that the Code of Conduct fact sheet clearly stated that all parties are to bear their own costs?

**Response**: We take that question on notice as well, Ms. Kelly, and you'll be responded to in the required statutory time period.

# Cheryl Swan, Paper Beach

# Statement:

People over the West Tamar might like to know that some of these people have been spending the morning with our Premier and others at Exeter. I know because I was there. Not with them, but I was there. Kerry Vincent's just had a little talk to me and has said he will hopefully proceed the pedestrian crossing that we so desperately need in Exeter. I'm not going to hold my breath, but I look forward to seeing that actually done. So, a commitment, he's made me a commitment. We'll see what happens.

Currently there is a development application at 171 Paper Beach Road waiting for decision by this Council whether it can proceed or not. You have my objection to it already. This particular application has no purpose written in the application of what it's to be used for. I do not understand how this Council can accept an application when you don't know what the development is to be used for. Let alone all the reasons that I have spoken of in my objection, which looking at it and all the reasons I've said, this clearly is not a residential building. I hope that you actually do look at the detail of this application and make a decision that is appropriate. We have, I think it's nearly 25,000 people living in the West Tamar with almost 11,000 residential properties. If a development such as this is allowed to proceed and be done, then all the existing properties and any in the future will be at risk of losing their residential amenity.

So every single person in this community won't want to live where they are if a similar development is allowed to proceed next door, including you, Mayor.

payable by AXA, the only cost to Council is the applicable excess.

### 5.2.2 G Hay, Beauty Point

Question 1: During my attendance at the last Council meeting it was not made clear to Rate Payers if the Mayor has repaid approximately \$5'300 owed to the West Tamar Council & its rate payers for Legal fee's that the Councils Rate Payers paid on her behalf in the Mayor's defence of a Code of Conduct Complain made again her, have these fund yet be refunded in not why not?

### Response:

The Mayor has paid the invoice issued by the Chief Executive Officer for the \$5,500 insurance excess.

Question 2: How many other such Code of Conduct Complaints against the Mayor or other Councillors have called on the Council's insurance cover and Council funding for 2023 to 2025 in using the West Tamar Council legal advisers & are there other other costs i.e. staff & facilities including in these costs in defencing Code of Conduct Complaints made in attending into their duties at the West Tamar Council, for it seems the rate payers have funded these costs where the procedural documents in making a Code of Conduce Complaints make it crystal clear, the parties are too fund their own legal cost and not the Council.

### Response:

- 1. No insurance coverage has been claimed in relation to a Code of Conduct complaint outside of the one already disclosed.
- 2. Council is liable for costs associated with Code of Conduct Investigations and any sanctions that may result from a Code of Conduct determination as set out in the Local Government Act 1993. All costs paid by Council in relation to Code of Conduct complaints are reported in Councils Annual Report each year.

Question 3: If insurance and rate players moneys has been paid out on behalf of the Mayor by Rate Payers for her legal fee's in defending the Code of Conduct complaint against her, where clearly the existing guidelines for a Code of Conduct Complain are very specific in that each party are responsible for their own legal fee's and not the rate payers. The Mayor has been a Councillor, Deputy Mayor, and Mayor for the West Tamar Council for 16 years was the Mayor ignorant of the procedures clearly outline within the Code of Conduct guidelines?

# Response:

The Mayor followed the advice she was provided at the time by Senior Council Officers in good faith.

### 7 PLANNING AUTHORITY

Councils is now sitting as a planning authority. Each council acts as the planning authority for their municipality. In this role, councillors consider development applications and make administrative decisions that are based on the council's planning scheme. While councillors are obliged to consider the community's views, this does not mean they can vote in favour of those views while fulfilling the role of a planning authority. Councillors must make planning decisions based on whether a planning application is consistent with the local planning scheme, even if members of the community object to the planning proposal.

### RECOMMENDATION

That application PA2025101 be determined as follows:

- (a) the requested variations comply with the relevant performance criteria and be supported;
- (b) matters raised by the representor have been considered but do not alter the assessment against the Scheme or the recommendation; and

That the application for Sports and Recreation (Canoe Polo) and associated works by the Tamar Canoe Polo Club for land at Blackstone Park Lot No. 2 on Plan No. 183402 be <u>APPROVED</u> subject to the following conditions:

### ENDORSED PLANS

- The use and development must be substantially in accordance with the following endorsed documents:
  - (a) Endorsed plans by BE ME Geotechnical, ref: Blackstone Paddlesports Park V5 (undated) seven (7) sheets;
  - (b) Design Report by Tamar Canoe Club dated April 2025;

Any other development and/or use, or substantial intensification of the approved use, may require separate assessment, and a fresh application should be submitted to Council.

### HOURS OF OPERATION

2. The hours of operation for the Sports and Recreation – Canoe Polo field and slalom track use must be between 8am to 10pm any day, including public holidays.

Note, the restriction on hours of operation only applies to the organised Sport and Recreation use including works associated with the setup and take down of infrastructure. The restriction does not apply to the Passive Recreation use (general use of the public park).

### SEASONAL REMOVAL OF INFRASTRUCTURE

Where infrastructure is removed at the end of a season, remaining fixtures must be maintained in a safe condition for all users of the site.

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### **EXTERNAL FINISHES IN THE ZONE**

4. All external materials, finishes and colours must be in accordance with the endorsed schedule of materials/colours.

### **CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT**

- 5. Prior to the commencement of works (including vegetation removal), a construction management plan must be submitted detailing how soil and water is to be managed during the construction process to prevent the escape of soil and sediments beyond site boundaries. This plan must clearly set out the property owner's obligations for erection, inspection and maintenance of all control measures approved. The management plan must include the following:
  - (a) date and author;
  - (b) property boundaries, location of adjoining roads and other public land if any, impervious surfaces, underground services and existing drainage, contours, approximate grades of slope, directions of fall, north point and scale;
  - (c) general soil description;
  - (d) location and types of all existing vegetation, location and amount of proposed ground disturbance, limit of clearing, grading and filling and the proposed location of soil, sand, topsoil and other material stockpiles;
  - (e) critical natural areas such as drainage lines, cliffs, wetlands and unstable ground;
  - (f) location of vegetation to be retained and removed;
  - (g) location of stabilised site access;
  - (h) initial and final contours, location of watercourses, surface drainage and existing stormwater infrastructure:
  - (i) stormwater discharge point, if proposed;
  - (j) location of all proposed temporary drainage control measures;
  - (k) construction details;
  - (I) location and details of all proposed erosion control measures, including measures to minimise release of particulates into the water body;
  - (m) location and details of all proposed measures to minimize dust generation and emission beyond the site boundaries;
  - (n) location and details of all proposed sediment control measures;
  - (o) a statement of who is responsible for establishing and maintaining erosion and sediment control measures:
  - (p) site rehabilitation or landscaping/revegetation program;
  - (q) estimated dates for start and finish of the works including installation sequence of different erosion and sediment controls;
  - (r) any information required to address soil, water and dust control measures required to accommodate staging of the proposal; and
  - (s) outline of the maintenance program for erosion and sediment controls. This must include weekly inspection as well as before and after every rain event and a reporting schedule to Council.

Works must not commence prior to the approval of the Construction Management Plan by the Director of Community Assets or their delegate. The approved plan must be implemented with the commencement of works on site and maintained during construction to ensure soil erosion and dust are appropriately managed to reasonably maintain the amenity of adjoining and nearby properties and public land. A copy of the approved Construction Management Plan must be on the site at all times. All on-ground workers must be aware of and understand the plan.

### **COMMENCED DEVELOPMENT STOP**

Where development has commenced on site and then stops for two weeks or more, interim stormwater, erosion and dust control measures must be installed and maintained on site to ensure overland flows do not become a nuisance to adjoining properties or Council's

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infrastructure until work recommences. The measures must include weekly inspections and reporting to Council as well as before and after every rain event to the satisfaction of the Director of Infrastructure and Assets or their delegate. This may require a revision of the approved Construction Management Plan – any changes must be approved by the Director of Infrastructure and Assets or their delegate.

### **WATERWAY BUFFER PROTECTION**

6. Works within the mapped waterway buffer, or within the buffer as defined in the Code, must be undertaken in accordance with the *Wetlands and Waterways Works Manual*.

#### 17.1 Councillors' Questions on Notice

All answers to Questions on Notice have been prepared by the Chief Executive Officer, Kristen Desmond.

#### Cr Larner

#### Question 1:

Tasmania and Western Australia do not require property agents to disclose landslip risks to buyers. At the ALGA AGM in June 2025, West Tamar Council's motion for a National Property Disclosure Standard was carried, but no response has been received from the Federal Government. How can Council urge ALGA to press the Australian Government for a national property disclosure standard?

#### Response:

Council is awaiting notification from the Australian Local Government Association (ALGA) before it takes any additional steps. I do not believe it is appropriate to interfere with ALGA's established processes. ALGA receives responses from the Federal Government and to date ALGA has not confirmed with Council if any response has been received.

Question 2: The 2023 flash flooding at Beach Road Legana caused significant landslip, but the area's risk has not been reclassified. Properties on Flinders Street, Beauty Point, were sold without disclosing their 'Landslip A' classification, despite historical dwellings being structurally secure.

- i) How can the State government or Mineral Resources Tas be approached to arrange accurate and consistent landslip classifications at Beach Road Legana. Flinders Street Beauty Point or any other landslip 'Medium-High Hazard' mapped properties in the municipality?
- ii). Does Council intend to request relevant authorities to conduct accurate landslip assessments and/or reclassification for those properties affected in Flinders Street Beauty Point and Beach Road Legana?

#### Response:

Council has previously been briefed in relation to the above situation. I will organise for a briefing to be provided to you by the Director of Planning and Development and the Director of Community Assets.

## Question 3:

i). Why does the Draft West Tamar Growth Strategy (Growth Strategy) plan for 'Growth Consolidation' in the extensive 'Landslip A' Flinders Street Beauty Point waterfront precinct, where building is currently not permitted?

## Response:

The Growth Strategy is intended to be a high-level strategic document and Flinders Street remains part of the urban area of Beauty Point. The Growth Strategy will not regulate building standards.

ii). How could the Draft Amendment 01-2024 of the State Planning Provisions, with its particular focus on landslip and coastal erosion, allow future building in the 'Landslip A' zone through hazard management measures?

Response: This is a question for the State Planning Office.

iii). Since the goal is to avoid increasing risk to life, property and the environment during landslide event, it appears that there is less down-side risk to (absent) properties by those up-side of the waterfront: therefore, do the Building Act 2016 and Building Regulations 2016 accurately reflect the landslip hazard impacts for appropriate residential land use development in the Beauty Point waterfront 'Landslip A' area, given there is no 'down-side' property in danger of such risk?

**Response:** This is a matter for the State Government.

iv) What rationale can Council use to approach the State government for a review and amendment of the *Building Act 2016* and/or *Building Regulations 2016* to accommodate appropriate risk-mitigating residential development and engineered building on 'high-hazard' 'Landslip A' classified properties?

**Response:** Council would need to form an endorsed position on this matter before advocacy could take place. The rationale for that decision is a matter for Council to determine.

vi). Will Council request the State Government to direct review and amendment recommendation of the landslip provisions of the *Building Act 2016* or *Building Regulations 2016*?

Response: There is no endorsed Council position to do this.

vii). In the Growth Strategy for Beauty Point, why was the residential use land south of 30 Flinders Street mapped as 'Lifestyle area' when it has no landslip hazard classification and is more suitable for 'Growth Consolidation' than the properties to the north?

**Response:** Councillors and all members of the West Tamar Municipality had an opportunity to provide feedback to Council via its consultation process.

viii). Where is the evidence that the Consultant was aware of TasWater's advice about the at-capacity sewerage treatment plants and their impact on proposed residential growth?

**Response:** Taswater has advised Council that it will not refuse a residential property being connected to the sewerage system where this service is available.

ix). Given the lack of relevant detail in the 'growth consolidation' and residential use mapping, what is the (fixed) cost value of the Growth Strategy Consultant's contract?

**Response:** I reject the assertion that the mapping has a "lack of relevant detail" - this is your opinion.

The cost of the Strategic Growth Strategy process was approved in the 2025/2026 budget. The Strategic Growth Strategy is still in draft and is an overarching document, it is not intended to go to a granular level and is yet to be finalised.

Question 4: i). What adapted construction standards (if any) are to be met, with oversight of Council, for those existing dwellings which have suffered damage from an 'anomaly' rainfall event, such as those on Beach Road Legana?

Response: Council does not set construction standards – this is a matter for the State

Government.

ii). For what reasons do these recently affected properties at Legana require, or not require, formal reclassification as to Landslip Hazard rating?

**Response:** This is a matter for the State Government.

iii). Since requirement for expert geotechnical reports of individual properties as to their actual level of landslip hazard may support development using appropriate engineering specifications for any new building applications for these sites, how may this approach assist planning for mapped 'growth consolidation' for Beauty Point in the Growth Strategy?

Response: The growth Strategy will not go into granular detail. Revising the Landslip hazard

categories is a matter for State Government.

Question 5: While liability for property damage caused by landslip rests with the owner, 10 year liability for building construction failure rests personally with the Council's Building Inspector.

i). How can the State Minister for Local Government seek greater insurance liability protection for Council's in-house Building Surveyors under the Building Act 2016 or other relevant legislation?

Response: This is a matter for the State Government.

ii). While not core Council business, given the current crisis in affordable housing availability would Council consider employing an extra registered Building Surveyor dedicated to review lower cost housing developments in order to encourage and assist private sector initiative for such in this municipality?

**Response:** There is no budget for additional FTE to be added to Councils establishment and at this stage there are no plans to engage an additional Building Surveyor.

Question 6: How many West Tamar municipality businesses have been contacted or advised about the increased \$20,000 provision for the competitive 2025/2026 Business Grants and what are the names of those businesses?

**Response:** 318 business in the West Tamar Municipality have been contacted to date. It would not appropriate to list them in the Agenda.

Question 7: The Department of Primary Industries Parks Water & Environment is in oversight of Council's application for development of the estuary Crown Lands at Gravelly Beach foreshore; the seawalls and coastal environmental considerations are their responsibility. The limestone rock sea walls of Stage 1 (completed) and ageing concrete barrier wall existing at Stage 1 & Stage 2 are being undermined by action of salty waves, but these items are not addressed in the Stage 1 nor Stage 2 Masterplan designs.

The impressive recent upgrade of the Beauty Point foreshore with generous government grant includes non-eroding dolerite rock sloped revetment supporting the connector footpath to Seahorse World & Aquarium, which serves as an effective buffer to wave action.

How can Council negotiate with Parks to amend the Masterplan Stage 2 to satisfy environmental and erosion concerns before proceeding with the Gravelly Beach project using the available grant money?

Response:

Council has endorsed the Gravelly Beach Masterplan. No negotiations will occur on anything outside of the current endorsed plans.

Question 1: What actions is Council considering, if any, to address the seawall concerns raised

Response: Council officers will be contacting Parks and Wildlife to clarify the limits of

responsibility between Parks and Council in respect to foreshore erosion issues. In anticipation of Council being responsible for sea wall construction to provide protection to the road, officers will prepare a concept design and cost estimate for recommended works that can be workshopped with Council ahead of future budget

decisions.

Question 2: Will Council replace the trees that were removed in Yarrabi Way, Legana, and if so,

when?

Response: There were a small number of trees removed from the Yerrabi Way reserve a few

years ago in order to undertake the construction and duplication of drainage pipework.

There have been no plans to date to replace those trees.

Question 3: When does Council anticipate commencing Stage 1 of the Greens Beach

Masterplan?

Response: Subject to receipt of a Reserve Activity Assessment approval from Parks and Wildlife

to undertake work on Parks managed land, it is anticipated that the first stage of works

will commence in the first quarter of the new calendar year.

Question 4: When does Council expect works to commence on the new Orchards playground?

Response: A tender for the early works package at the Orchards playground has been issued

and officers will be seeking Council approval to award that contract at the November Council Meeting. The package of work for playground equipment supply and installation will be tendered in the coming weeks with approval to award that contract planned to come to Council at the December Council Meeting. The commencement of works will be dependent on supplier availability, however, officers are working

toward a completion of the project by the end of March 2026.

Question 5: When does Council expect the new basketball court at Beaconsfield to be completed?

Response: The installation of post, backboard and ring is expected to be completed by the end

of October. Officers are confirming with the line marking supplier for the timing to

#### Question 1:

It's just regarding the augmentation of our waste recycling. And I notice that the recycle rewards program has really taken off in West Tamar. I think in July we hit over 500,000 deposits just at the Windsor one down here which has raised \$50,000 to the community, either individuals or their selected charities and they've had to put in a second one in Beaconsfield, I believe, as well. So this is obviously something that our community wants to do. When I was interstate recently, I spotted alongside regular waste bins, and I did send a picture of this to councillors, a simple basket mechanism where people could put in aluminium cans or glass bottles for other members of the community to come and collect them. Now, there may be some certain occupational health and safety things that need to be addressed here, but I thought it was such a simple idea and a way of capitalising on what we're already doing well. My question is, would it be possible for Council to look into the pricing of such an idea in the municipality and where and how that might work, just that additional waste basket for recycling alongside, especially in our high use areas, maybe Greens Beach or Beaconsfield and in and around Windsor?

#### Response:

We can certainly take that question on notice, Councillor Sladden, and supply you with the answers that you want to that question.

#### Cr Ferguson

#### Statement:

Last YAC meeting there was discussion about maintenance of the underpass for the school at times being untidy and graffitied. the Infrastructure Manager might expect some contact, probably through our council officers actually on that from that last meeting.

Also just to report back to Council that the Infrastructure Manager got back to YAC and informed them that the school zone sign is actually not in the best position and that is being re-evaluated. That came through YAC feedback, so that was pleasing to have that come back, thank you for following that up, Dino.

#### Cr Lyons

#### Statement:

I did a walk through with other councillors of the goat track at Exeter with a member of the community, Barry Blenkhorn, who pointed out his concerns about the potential subdivision in that whole area, and it was really worthwhile doing. It cemented my view that it's going to take a considerable amount of entrepreneurial skills to get any subdivision up in that area. I just thought I should report that to Council.

### 5.2.1 J Dorman, Swan Point

#### **Jeanette Dorman, Swan Point**

### Question 1:

There are four large (30-40m) radiata pines on the track between the car park at Paper Beach to where the track descends to the river level. Over the last couple of years, huge limbs have fallen from two of these trees - none during high winds. During our last gale (Oct. 2025), two macracarpa pines on private property were blown out of the ground, causing extensive damage to the track, outbuildings and a fence.

Submissions regarding the radiata pines on Council land to the WTC in the past, resulted only in the fallen limbs being removed and an assurance that all radiatas were now "safe". Paper Beach is a very popular place for many people - school groups visit regularly, dog walkers every day, families with young children often, local residents take their daily exercise on the track and beach and tourists routinely camp here.

Radiata pines have an expected lifespan of 80-90 years; my calculations based on their girth indicate that they are all well into their 90's. Given the proximity of these pines to the Paper Beach car park, the barbeque area, toilet block, playground and residences, the risk to life and property and the concomitant liability the WTC carries is significant.

What plans do the WTC have to manage the risks associated with these pine trees that have passed their "use by" date that include taking all reasonable measures to ensure the safety of residents and visitors?

#### Response:

Council officers are currently awaiting the receipt of a report from an external contractor engaged to undertake an assessment of the trees in question. Irrespective of the findings of the report, Council officers have begun to schedule a program of works including quarterly ground-based inspections of the trees.

Council officers will engage directly with yourself once the report has been received and reviewed.

Question 1: How much does it (Council) take into account the character of the areas and its natural values in considering applications of this type?

As a Planning Authority, the Council's assessment of an application is bound by the requirements of the Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993 and the Tasmanian Planning Scheme. Multiple dwellings are a permitted use in the General Residential Zone. The application met all but four acceptable solutions, so the assessment of discretionary matters was bound to only those matters - being building height, pedestrian access, traffic generation and landslip. As detailed in the assessment included in the meeting agenda, impacts on amenity were considered in the assessment of the building height discretion.

The site has not been mapped as a Priority Vegetation Area or containing any specific natural values under the planning scheme and this did not form part of the assessment.

#### INTRODUCTION

#### **ROAD AUTHORITY COMMENTS**

The Road Authority under consideration of the *Local Government Act (Highways) 1982* provided the following advice:

The proposed outbuilding and driveway extension is not expected to create any additional regular traffic movements at the existing crossover, or any negative impact to the surrounding road network.

### STORMWATER AUTHORITY COMMENTS

The Stormwater Authority under consideration of the *Urban Drainage Act 2013* provided the following advice:

The subject site does not have a recorded stormwater connection to Council's public stormwater system, although it is likely that an unmapped, legacy connection exists to drain the existing dwelling.

Stormwater from the outbuilding roof and surrounding area of the outbuilding will be collected and contained within an on-site absorption area.

An unsealed driveway is proposed to access the new outbuilding, via an extension of an existing unsealed driveway within the site. Unsealed driveways are typical in this area and are considered suitable for the development. The driveway extension is not expected to create a stormwater nuisance to neighbouring properties or increase the likelihood of sediment being transported onto the public road.

The application was notified for the required 14 day period in accordance with the Act. Full copies of the representations received during the public exhibition period were provided with this report. Consideration of any representation is a requirement under both the Scheme and the Act.

The number of representations received during this time was two (2).

ISSUE 1	Safety concerns regarding lack of railing shown on the proposal plans for the Mezzanine level and stairs.	
ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	and design of outbuildings. Details such as balustrading are not assessed	
	However, the inclusion of balustrading for fall protection and staircase design are assessable under the Building Act. The internal layout of the outbuilding will be assessed for compliance at the building application stage by a Building Surveyor.	
	Minor alterations to the internal layout can be made as required and do not trigger the requirement for further planning assessment.	
ISSUE 2	The drainage from the outbuilding roof may inundate adjoining properties.	



ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	Stormwater from the roof of the outbuilding and surrounding area will be collected and contained within an onsite absorption area. The proposed outbuilding is compliant with the planning scheme and cannot be further assessed.  The Stormwater Authority has reviewed the proposed gravel extension of the driveway and advised that it will not generate or increase stormwater nuisance to adjoining properties.
ISSUE 3	Power disruptions to adjoining properties.
ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	It is expected that the outbuilding will be provided with a power connection. Any electrical work will need to be undertaken by a qualified electrician in accordance with any requirements of TasNetworks. Typically, electrical works are planned to avoid or minimise power disruption, and any effected property notified.
ISSUE 4	The proposed outbuilding may be used for residential purposes and the design of the building is not consistent with a residential/hobbyist use.
ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	This is not a matter that relates to the discretion being assessed by this application. However, the applicant has advised that the outbuilding will be used as a workshop, garage, storage and associated residential purposes.  Outbuildings cannot be used for habitable purposes, such as bedrooms or dwellings, and this is enforced through a standard condition on the planning permit.  Use of the proposed outbuilding for commercial purposes is not permitted. Should the owner wish to establish a home occupation or a home-based business in the future, a further planning requirements would apply. The requirements limit the types of activities that could be permitted, to avoid impacts on residential amenity.  The planning scheme does not dictate the design of outbuildings based on the specific hobbies or residential activities of the current occupants. However, as the ground level is identified as 'Workshop' and 'Garage', it can be expected to accommodate parking of personal vehicles. There is also no restriction on the storage or use of personal machinery as long as it is not for a commercial purpose and within residential noise limits.
ISSUE 5	The proposed outbuilding is inconsistent with the character of the neighbourhood.
ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	The proposed outbuilding is fully compliant with the applicable planning scheme requirements, including site area and height. The only discretion relates to the gravel surface of the driveway extension.  Where Acceptable Solutions are achieved, further assessment against Performance Criteria in relation to building design or character cannot be undertaken.  Notwithstanding, large outbuildings are a common feature on similar sized blocks in the area, including along this part of Paper Beach Road.



ISSUE 6	Previous alterations including tree removal and shipping container additions have been undertaken without approval.			
ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	The site is partially mapped as being within a Priority Vegetation Area However, the Natural Assets Code does not apply to development within the Low Density Residential Zone. No planning permit is required prior to tree removal.			
	The application did not include the permanent placement of shipping containers on the site. If they remain on the site, further investigation and appropriate compliance action will be undertaken.			
	Council's compliance team has investigated works that may have been undertaken on the property. Any potential compliance issues have been satisfactorily resolved and do not form part of this application.			
ISSUE 7	The proposal will result in loss of private open space amenity			
ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	The proposed outbuilding complies with all planning scheme requirements in relation to building height, site coverage, setbacks and private open space for the existing dwelling.			
	The site coverage of buildings represents a small portion of the total site area of 7996m². As the Acceptable Solutions are achieved no further assessment of private open space and building design can be undertaken.			
ISSUE 8	The proposed outbuilding will affect power generation from nearby solar panels due to overshadowing.			
ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	The proposed outbuilding complies with the Acceptable Solutions for building height and setbacks for the Low Density Residential Zone. As the Acceptable Solutions are achieved, further assessment of overshadowing is not possible as a relevant planning matter.			
	Notwithstanding, the proposed outbuilding is setback 10.98m from the southwestern side boundary, being more than double the Acceptable Solution setback of 5 metres.			
ISSUE 9	Concern regarding development occurring in adjacent property.			
ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	No works are being proposed on adjacent properties. All works are to be contained within the property boundaries of 171 Paper Beach Road.			

### **OPTIONS**

The Planning Authority may approve (with or without conditions) or refuse the application, based on its assessment against the Scheme and any representations that were received.

A recommendation for approval is provided with conditions. Any alternative recommendation/s requires justification with relevant planning reasons.



#### PROFESSIONAL COMMENTS OF THE ASSESSING OFFICER

The assessing officer has evaluated the proposal and is satisfied the proposal meets the relevant acceptable solutions and demonstrates compliance with the performance criteria for the requested discretions.

The matters raised by the representors have been considered but do not impact the assessment of the application and the officer's recommendation. The only discretion for this application is for the unsealed driveway, which is not a matter raised by the representors.

As such, the assessing officer recommends the development for approval.

#### RECOMMENDATION

That application PA2025177 for Residential – Outbuilding at 171 Paper Beach Road, Swan Point be determined as follows:

- (a) the requested variations comply with the relevant performance criteria and be supported;
- (b) matters raised by the representor have been considered but do not alter the assessment against the Scheme or the recommendation; and

That the application for Residential - Outbuilding by Plans to Build, for land at 171 Paper Beach Road Lot No. 1 on Plan No. 111341 be **APPROVED** subject to the following conditions:

#### **ENDORSED PLANS**

- 1. The use and development must be substantially in accordance with the following endorsed documents:
  - (a) Endorsed plans by Plans to Build, dated 18/09/2025 Project number 24145 (13 Sheets)

Any other proposed development and/or use, or substantial intensification of the use, will require a separate application to and assessment by the Council.

### **DRIVEWAY AND PARKING AREA CONSTRUCTION**

- 2. Before the commencement of the use, parking bays and access ways as shown on the endorsed plans must:
  - (a) Be properly constructed to such levels that they can be used in accordance with the plans;
  - (b) Be adequately drained to prevent stormwater being discharged to neighbouring property; and
  - (c) Parking areas and access lanes must be kept available for these purposes at all times and maintained for the life of the use.

### **OUTBUILDINGS**

3. The use of outbuildings is not permitted for human habitation and is limited to residential storage and related residential activities only.

#### SOIL, WATER AND DUST CONTROL

- 4. Soil, water and dust must be managed on the site during construction to:
  - (a) prevent the escape of soil and sediments beyond site boundaries; and
  - (b) direct water runoff to a lawful point of discharge without causing nuisance for neighbours.

Where development has commenced on site and then stops for two weeks or more, interim stormwater, erosion and dust control measures must:

- (c) be installed and maintained on site to the satisfaction of the Director Infrastructure;
- (d) ensure that overland flows do not become a nuisance to adjoining properties or Councils infrastructure;
- (e) be maintained until work recommences on site; and
- (f) include a weekly inspection as well as before and after every rain event and a reporting schedule to Council.

### **Permit Notes**

- A. This permit was issued based on the proposal documents submitted for PA2025177. You should contact Council with any other use or developments, as they may require the separate approval of Council.
- B. This permit take effect after:
  - (a) The 14 day appeal period expires; or
  - (b) Any appeal to the Tasmanian Civil and Administrative Tribunal is abandoned or determined; or
  - (c) Any agreement that is required by this permit pursuant to Part 5 of the *Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993* is executed; or
  - (d) Any other required approvals under this or any other Act are granted.
- C. This permit is valid for two (2) years only from the date of approval and will thereafter lapse if the development is not substantially commenced. An extension may be granted subject to the provisions of the *Land use Planning and Approvals Act 1993* as amended, by a request to Council.

### **Other Approvals**

D. This permit does not imply that any other approval required under any other by-law or legislation has been granted.

### **Appeal Provisions**

E. A planning appeal may be instituted by lodging a notice of appeal with the Registrar of the Tasmanian Civil and Administrative Tribunal.

A planning appeal may be instituted within 14 days of the date the Corporation serves notice of the decision on the applicant.

#### INTRODUCTION

Council acts as a Planning Authority for the assessment of this application under the *Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993* (**the Act**). Council as the Planning Authority must determine the application for a permit pursuant to Section 51(2) of the Act and 6.10 of the *Tasmanian Planning Scheme – West Tamar* (**the Scheme**).

In determining an application, the Planning Authority must take into consideration:

- (a) "all applicable standards and requirements in this planning scheme; and
- (b) Any representations received pursuant to and in conformity with section 57(5) of the Act.

But in the case of the exercise of discretion, <u>only insofar as each such matter is relevant to the particular discretion being exercised."</u>

Compliance with the applicable standards (a) consists of complying with the Acceptable Solution or satisfying the Performance Criteria. The use of "or" is to be read plainly that if an application satisfies the Acceptable Solution, no consideration of the Performance Criteria is required.

The purpose of this report is for the Council to consider a proposal for a minor boundary adjustment between 76 and 78 Reatta Road and construction of a new dwelling and outbuilding at 76 Reatta Road, Trevallyn.

The proposed dwelling has a total floor area of 285m² and includes three bedrooms, a garage, family room, living and dining areas, kitchen, and a covered deck. The proposed outbuilding has an area of 82.5 m². Vehicle access will be provided via the existing crossover, which is proposed to be extended. Single Dwellings are a 'No permit required' use within the General Residential Zone. However, a discretionary application is required due to a minor encroachment outside of the building envelope specified in the Acceptable Solution.

The proposal also includes a minor boundary adjustment between 76 and 78 Reatta Road, which is 'Permitted' under Clause 7.3 of the Planning Scheme and complies with all relevant standards. There are no discretions in relation to boundary adjustment component of the application.

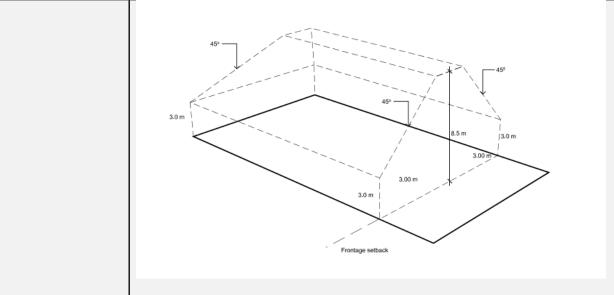


Figure 8.1 Building envelope required by 8.4.2 A3(a)

# PERFORMANCE CRITERIA

**P3** The siting and scale of a dwelling must:

- (a) not cause an unreasonable loss of amenity to adjoining properties, having regard to:
  - (i) reduction in sunlight to a habitable room (**other than a bedroom**) of a dwelling on an adjoining property;
  - (ii) overshadowing the private open space of a dwelling on an adjoining property;
  - (iii) overshadowing of an adjoining vacant property; and
  - (iv) visual impacts caused by the apparent scale, bulk or proportions of the dwelling when viewed from an adjoining property;
- (b) provide separation between dwellings on adjoining properties that is consistent with that existing on established properties in the area; and
- (c) not cause an unreasonable reduction in sunlight to an existing solar energy installation on:
  - (i) an adjoining property; or
  - (ii) another dwelling on the same site.

# ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS

The proposed dwelling complies with Acceptable Solution A3(b) as less than 9 metres of length is located within 1.5m of the eastern side boundary.

However, the height of the dwelling protrudes outside the building envelope shown on Figure 8.1 in the abovementioned Acceptable Solution. Accordingly, an assessment against the Performance Criteria is required.

The dwelling exceeds the building envelope on the eastern side, adjacent to 74 Reatta Road, as illustrated by the red-shaded area in the figure below.



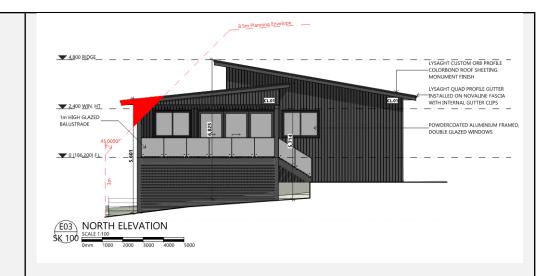


Figure 1: Proposed Building Envelope

Despite the minor encroachment outside the building envelope, the proposal will not have unreasonable loss to the amenity of adjoining properties, as follows:

(i) The closest property to the building envelope encroachment is 74 Reatta Road. Shadow diagrams provided with the application demonstrate that the proposed dwelling will not cause an unreasonable loss of sunlight to a habitable room (other than a bedroom) of adjoining dwellings. Both dwellings will continue to receive more than three hours of direct sunlight on 21 June. Overshadowing on 78 Reatta Road will occur only in the morning (between 9:00 am and 11:00 am), while 74 Reatta Road will experience some overshadowing in the afternoon (between 2:00 pm and 4:00 pm).





Figure 2: Shadow diagrams on 21st June

(ii) In addition, the adjacent property has adequate private open space areas in the north of the lot that will remain unshaded for the majority of the day, as demonstrated in the submitted diagrams. The scale, bulk, and form of the proposed dwelling is consistent with existing development in the surrounding area and will not result in visual intrusion or unreasonable loss of amenity when viewed from adjoining properties.



- (iii) 76 Reatta Road does not adjoin any vacant land that would be overshadowed.
- (iv) The extent of height encroachment outside the building envelope, as shown in the image above, is relatively minor. It will not significantly increase the visual bulk of the building when viewed from the adjacent property compared to the Acceptable Solution.

The separation distances between dwellings are also consistent with the established pattern of development in the surrounding General residential zone. The dwelling complies with the required setbacks, including a 1.0m setback for 8.4m length and 1.5m for the remainder of the dwelling's eastern facade.

The adjoining property does not have a known solar energy installation that would be overshadowed by the proposal.

Therefore, the proposal satisfies the relevant Performance Criteria.

#### **ROAD AUTHORITY COMMENTS**

The Road Authority under consideration of the *Local Government Act (Highways) 1982* provided the following advice:

The proposal seeks to realign the boundary between 76 and 78 Reatta Road and construct a new dwelling and outbuilding on the realigned 76 Reatta Road. It is understood that the realigned boundary is to provide additional area for the proposed outbuilding.

A dwelling exists on the current 78 Reatta Road. 76 Reatta Road is vacant but has an existing sealed driveway and crossover which will be retained to access the new dwelling. The existing, albeit modified, crossover will be used to access the new dwelling and outbuilding and a new crossover will be constructed to access the existing dwelling from the frontage of 78 Reatta Road.

It is expected that the new dwelling will create up to 9 additional daily vehicle movements. Reatta Road and the surrounding road network can easily absorb the small increase in traffic.

There are no discretions in relation to road or access matters.

# STORMWATER AUTHORITY COMMENTS

The Stormwater Authority under consideration of the *Urban Drainage Act 2013* provided the following advice:

Vacant 76 Reatta Road does not currently have a connection to a reticulated stormwater system. However, there is an existing stormwater main in the verge and the land naturally falls away from the road, toward the Council reserve to the north. There is approximately three metres of elevation difference between the southeast and northeast corners of the site.



The development proposes to provide a gravity stormwater connection from the southeast corner of the site, into the stormwater main in the verge. Stormwater from impervious surfaces will be collected and then be pumped up to the stormwater connection.

Since stormwater from impervious areas will be collected and drained to the public stormwater system, the development is not expected to create a nuisance.

There are no discretions in relation to stormwater matters.

#### **NOTIFICATION**

The application was notified for the required 14-day period in accordance with the Act. Full copies of the representations received during the public exhibition period were provided to the Councillors. Consideration of any representation is a requirement under both the Scheme and the Act.

The number of representations received during this time was one (1).

### ISSUE 1

Concern regarding overshadowing and loss of amenity to 74 Reatta Road as a result of the building envelope encroachment. Also provided additional information regarding habitable rooms on the adjacent dwelling, as follows:

The site plan and shadow diagrams indicate a habitable room (bedroom) facing north that will lose some afternoon sun but the diagrams appear to omit two other windows on the western wall in habitable rooms that will be more adversely affected. Both of these windows are also bedrooms.

# ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS

It is acknowledged that the proposed dwelling will result in some additional overshadowing to the dwelling at 74 Reatta Road, particularly affecting the western elevation where Bedroom 2 and Bedroom 3 are located.

As demonstrated in the submitted shadow diagrams, the overshadowing will primarily affect the bedroom windows on the western side of the adjoining dwelling. Under the Tasmanian Planning Scheme 8.4.2 P3(a)(i), the performance criteria seeks to protect sunlight access to habitable rooms other than bedrooms (i.e., living rooms, kitchens, dining areas), as these are the primary spaces where sunlight access is considered essential to residential amenity.

It is acknowledged that the proposed dwelling extends marginally outside the building envelope and will result in some additional overshadowing to the western side of the adjoining dwelling at 74 Reatta Road. However, due to the natural topography of the site, some level of overshadowing would occur irrespective of the building envelope compliance. The extent of additional overshadowing is limited to the bedroom windows on the western elevation for part of the afternoon and does not result in an unreasonable loss of sunlight to the main habitable rooms or private open space of the adjoining property.

Accordingly, the proposal is considered to satisfy the performance criteria relating to building envelope and overshadowing.



#### **OPTIONS**

The Planning Authority may approve (with or without conditions) or refuse the application, based on its assessment against the Scheme and any representations that were received.

A recommendation for approval is provided with conditions. Any alternative recommendation/s requires justification with relevant planning reasons.

#### PROFESSIONAL COMMENTS OF THE ASSESSING OFFICER

The assessing officer has evaluated the proposal and is satisfied the proposal meets the relevant acceptable solutions and demonstrates compliance with the performance criteria for the requested discretions.

The matters raised by the representors have been considered but do not impact the assessment of the application and the officer's recommendation. The proposal complies with the Performance Criteria

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

That application PA2025275 be determined as follows:

- (a) the requested variations comply with the relevant performance criteria and be supported;
- (b) matters raised by the representor have been considered but do not alter the assessment against the Scheme or the recommendation; and

That the application for a Boundary Adjustment and Residential – Single Dwelling and Outbuilding by Cataract Designs, for land at 76 & 78 Reatta Road, Trevallyn, Lot No. 39 and 40 on Plan No. 54890 be **APPROVED** subject to the following conditions:

#### **ENDORSED PLANS**

- 1. The use and development must be substantially in accordance with the following endorsed documents:
  - (a) Endorsed plans by Cataract Designs dated 25/09/2025, project no. 25019 (Rev DA2)
  - (b) Shed plans by Fair Dinkum Builds Launceston, quote number 100504 dated 7/08/2025.

Any other development and/or use, or substantial intensification of the approved use, may require separate assessment and a fresh application should be submitted to Council.

#### **TASWATER**

2. The development must be in accordance with the Submission to Planning Authority Notice issued by TasWater (TWDA 2025/01076-WTC) attached.

### **DRIVEWAY AND PARKING AREA CONSTRUCTION**

- 3. Before commencement of the use, parking bays and access ways as shown on the endorsed plans must:
  - (a) be line-marked or otherwise delineated to indicate each car space and access lane;
  - (b) be properly constructed to such levels that they can be used in accordance with the plans:
  - (c) be surfaced with an all-weather (impervious) surface; and
  - (d) be adequately drained to prevent stormwater being discharged to neighbouring property. Parking areas and access lanes must be kept available for these purposes at all times and maintained for the life of the use.



#### **OUTBUILDINGS**

4. The use of outbuildings is not permitted for human habitation and is limited to residential storage and related activities only.

#### SUBMISSION AND APPROVAL OF PLANS

- 5. Prior to the commencement of any works on the site, detailed plans and specifications must be submitted to the Road and Stormwater Authority for approval. Such plans and specifications must:
  - (a) Include all infrastructure works required by the permit or shown in the endorsed plans and specifications including:
    - (i) The proposed electricity connection;
    - (ii) Communications infrastructure;
    - (iii) Any upgrades to the site access; and
    - (iv) The new site stormwater connection;
  - (b) Be prepared strictly in accordance with the *Tasmanian Subdivision Guidelines* applicable at the date of approval of the plans. These Guidelines are available at <a href="https://www.lgat.tas.gov.au">www.lgat.tas.gov.au</a>; and
  - (c) Be prepared by a suitably qualified person.

#### **CONSTRUCTION OF WORKS**

6. Prior to the sealing of the Final Plan of Subdivision, the private and public infrastructure works must be constructed in accordance with plans and specification approved by the Council. The required infrastructure works must be as shown in the application documents and endorsed plans or as modified by the approval of the detailed engineering drawings and specifications.

# STORMWATER WORKS

- 7. Stormwater works must include the provision of a stormwater connection from the property into the existing Council stormwater main located in the verge. The stormwater connection is to be designed and constructed in accordance with the following criteria:
  - (a) A pipe diameter of at least 100mm;
  - (b) At least 600mm of cover over the pipe in the road reserve:
  - (c) Pipe material is to uPVC;
  - (d) Pipe stiffness is to be at least classification SN8;
  - (e) Be a gravity connection; and
  - (f) Terminate with a receiving pit at the upstream end inside the property
- 8. Works in the road reserve shall not commence until an *Application for Works in a Road Reserve Form* has been submitted to Council and approved by the Road Authority.

#### **VEHICULAR CROSSING**

9. A vehicular crossing must be provided to each lot, prior to the sealing of the Final Plan of Subdivision.



- 10. Unless the Road Authority provides written advice otherwise, any modification to an existing crossover or driveway apron must be constructed in accordance with TSD-R09. The nature strip is to be battered with a slope no steeper than 1V:4H.
- 11. Works in the road reserve shall not commence until a *Driveway Application Form* has been submitted to Council and approved by the Road Authority.

#### SEPARATION OF SERVICE CONNECTIONS

- 12. The person responsible must locate and identify the existing service connections (water supply, sewer and stormwater) and complete the following work:
  - (a) Where required, reroute internal stormwater within each lot to provide an independent system for each lot.

#### **DEFECTS LIABILITY PERIOD**

13. A defects liability period of 12 months applies to all infrastructure required under this permit.

#### CONSTRUCTION DOCUMENTATION

- 14. At the time of practical completion of the infrastructure, Council must be provided with construction documentation sufficient to show that the works are completed in accordance with Council standards and are locatable for maintenance or connection purposes. The construction documentation must consist of:
  - (a) An "as constructed" plan in accordance with council's standard requirements for as constructed drawings;
  - (b) Completed "Asset Recording Forms" that show the construction cost of all new infrastructure to be maintained by Council.

#### SOIL AND WATER MANAGEMENT CONTROL PLAN

- 15. Prior to the commencement of any works on site (including vegetation removal), a site management plan must be submitted detailing how soil and water is to be managed on the site during the construction process to prevent the escape of soil and sediments beyond site boundaries. This plan must clearly set out the property owner's obligations for erection, inspection and maintenance of all control measures approved. The management plan must include the following:
  - (a) Date and author;
  - (b) Property boundaries, location of adjoining roads, impervious surfaces, underground services and existing drainage, contours, approximate grades of slope, directions of fall, north point and scale;
  - (c) General soil description;
  - (d) Location and types of all existing natural vegetation, location and amount of the proposed ground disturbance, the limit of clearing, grading and filling and the proposed location of soil, sand, topsoil and other material stockpiles.
  - (e) Critical natural areas such as drainage lines, cliffs, wetlands and unstable ground:
  - (f) Location of vegetation to be retained and removed;
  - (g) Location of stabilised site access;
  - (h) Initial and final contours, location of watercourses, surface drainage and existing stormwater infrastructure;
  - (i) Stormwater discharge point, if proposed;



- (j) Location of all proposed temporary drainage control measures;
- (k) Construction details buildings or subdivision;
- (I) Location and details of all proposed erosion control measures;
- (m) Location and details of the measures to minimise dust escaping from the site;
- (n) Location and details of all proposed sediment control measures;
- (o) A statement of who is responsible for establishing and maintaining erosion and sediment control measures;
- (p) Site rehabilitation or revegetation/landscaping program;
- (q) The estimated dates for the start and finish of the works including the installation sequence of the different erosion and sediment controls;
- (r) Any information required to address soil, water and dust control measures required to accommodate staging of the proposal;
- (s) Outline of the maintenance program for the erosion and sediment controls; this must include a weekly inspection as well as before and after every rain event and a reporting schedule to council.
- 16. Works must not commence prior to the approval of the Soil and Water Management Control Plan by the Director of Community Assets. The approved Plan must be implemented with the commencement of works on site and maintained during construction to ensure that soil erosion and dust are appropriately managed to reasonably maintain amenity of adjoining and nearby properties. A copy of the approved Soil and Water Management Plan must be on the site at all times. All on ground workers must be aware of and understand the plan.

#### COMMENCED DEVELOPMENT STOP

Where development has commenced on site and then stops for two weeks or more, interim stormwater, erosion and dust control measures must:

- (a) be installed and maintained on site to the satisfaction of the Director of Community Assets;
- (b) Ensure that overland flows do not become a nuisance to adjoining properties or council's infrastructure;
- (c) be maintained until work recommences on site; and
- (d) include a weekly inspection as well as before and after every rain event and a reporting schedule to council.

Measures under this condition may require a revised Soil and Water Management Control Plan to be approved for the site.

### **Permit Notes**

- A. This permit was issued based on the proposal documents submitted for PA2025275. You should contact Council with any other use or developments, as they may require the separate approval of Council.
- B. This permit take effect after:
  - (a) The 14 day appeal period expires; or
  - (b) Any appeal to the Tasmanian Civil and Administrative Tribunal is abandoned or determined: or
  - (c) Any agreement that is required by this permit pursuant to Part 5 of the *Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993* is executed; or
  - (d) Any other required approvals under this or any other Act are granted.



C. This permit is valid for two (2) years only from the date of approval and will thereafter lapse if the development is not substantially commenced. An extension may be granted subject to the provisions of the *Land use Planning and Approvals Act 1993* as amended, by a request to Council.

# **Other Approvals**

D. This permit does not imply that any other approval required under any other by-law or legislation has been granted.

# **Appeal Provisions**

E. A planning appeal may be instituted by lodging a notice of appeal with the Registrar of the Tasmanian Civil and Administrative Tribunal.

A planning appeal may be instituted within 14 days of the date the Corporation serves notice of the decision on the applicant.

#### **Permit Commencement**

F. A copy of Council's Notice to Waive Right of Appeal is attached.

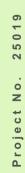

ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	The proposal is for 3 dwellings on a site with an area of 953m², resulting in a site area per dwelling of 317.7m². This is less than required to meet the Acceptable Solution of 325m², so consideration of the Performance Criteria is required.  The first part of clause 8.4.1 P1 requires development to be within the capacity of infrastructure services. Relevant infrastructure services required



to be considered include reticulated water, sewerage and stormwater and to a lesser extent road infrastructure.

With respect to water, sewerage and stormwater services, the site is located within an area with reticulated water and sewer under the authority of TasWater and stormwater under the authority of Council. The development application has been referred to TasWater in accordance with the statutory requirements and TasWater have issued a Submission to Planning Authority Notice, accepting the proposal. The proposal has been considered by Council's Engineer and no concerns were raised regarding the capacity of stormwater services.

It is estimated that the development of three 2-bedroom units will produce around 18 vehicle movements per day. Therefore, the proposed use satisfies clause C3.5.1 A1.4(a) on the basis that it will generate less than 40 vehicle movements per day using an existing vehicle crossing.

On this basis, the proposed development is not expected to exceed the capacity of infrastructure services.

Clause 8.4.3 P1(a) requires development for multiple dwellings with a site area per dwelling that is less than 325m² to be compatible with the density of existing development on established properties in the 'area'.

The Scheme does not define the term 'area'. There are several recognised methods for assessing and determining what constitutes an area where the term is required to be considered for compliance with a performance criterion. In this instance, a radius method has been adopted as the primary way to determine the extent of the area.

The spatial extent of the area (the Area') used for the purposes of determining compliance with clause 8.4.3 P1(a) is illustrated below, encompassing a radius of 400m around the site.





The following table provides a summary of the lots within the Area that contain multiple dwellings, including the proposed development:

The analysis reveals that there are currently 56 multiple dwellings over 18 lots within the Area and the average (mean) site area per dwelling is 454.9m<sup>2</sup> and the median is 436.3m<sup>2</sup>. The lowest existing site area per dwelling is 362.8m<sup>2</sup> per dwelling.

The Scheme does not define the term 'compatibility'. In the absence of a Scheme definition, compatibility is interpreted as not requiring consistency but requiring that the proposal be in harmony or broad correspondence with the area.

Based on the assessment of the area, the proposed multiple dwellings will be compatible with development on established properties within the area for the following reasons:

- The Proposal's site area per dwelling of 317.7m<sup>2</sup> will be only marginally lower than the Acceptable Solution of 325m<sup>2</sup> and the lowest existing site area per dwelling (362.8m<sup>2</sup>) for multiple dwellings in the Area;
- Spatially, the Proposal sits comfortably within the Area, being proximate to other multiple dwellings and single dwellings on smaller lot sizes. The Proposal is therefore in harmony or broad correspondence with the density of the area in this regard.
- The proposed dwellings are of a low height and form, will be well setback from the primary frontage and will be located one behind the other when viewed from Wivell Street. This will contribute to the dwellings not appearing incongruous or overtly contrasting with the existing pattern of development. The Proposal is therefore in harmony or broad correspondence with the density of the Area.

The Performance Criteria 8.4.1 P1(a) is therefore met.

With regard to Clause 8.4.3 P1(b), the term 'social or community' benefit is not defined in the Scheme. In the absence of a Scheme definition, it is considered that residential development that provides a significant social or community benefit is residential development that is for a clearly demonstrated or defined public, community or assisted housing purpose.

The application is for a private development that is not associated with a defined social or community housing benefit. On this basis, the proposal does not meet Performance Criteria 8.4.1 P1(b). However, only P1(a) or P1(b) need to be met. In this instance, the proposal relies on P1(a) to satisfy the Performance Criteria.



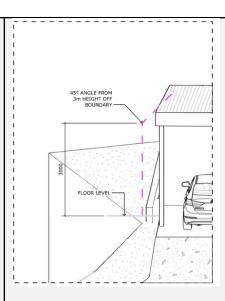

The proposed dwellings are single storey with a low roof form and height not exceeding 4.5m above natural ground level at any point.

# ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS

The proposed access driveway will have a width of 4m for the first 7m from the boundary, which is less than the 4.5m width required by Table C2.2 where the access is for 6-20 car parking spaces.

The existing crossover is a shared crossover with the neighbouring 3 Wivell Street. It has a total width of approximately 6m, with a driveway apron to each property boundary, approximately 11m from the carriageway to the site.

The internal driveway will be no less than 3m wide and is provided with passing bays within the site and vehicles will be able to turn onsite and leave in a forward direction.

The proposed development is expected to generate around 18 vehicle movements per day, with the low level and speed of traffic contributing to a safe and efficient access and parking area for vehicles and pedestrians. The proposal is residential in nature and the traffic generated will typically be light vehicles. The driveway access and parking will be finished in concrete. Wivell Street is a local no-through road with a low traffic volume.

Overall, the proposed parking, access ways, manoeuvring and circulation spaces are suitably designed to provide convenient, safe and efficient parking and access to the site.

#### **ROAD AUTHORITY COMMENTS**

The Road Authority under consideration of the *Local Government (Highways) Act 1982* provided the following advice:

The proposal seeks to create three new multiple dwellings which will access Wivell Street using an existing crossover.

The existing crossover is a shared crossover with the neighbouring 3 Wivell Street. It has a width of approximately 6m, with a driveway apron to each property boundary, approximately 11m from the carriageway to the subject site. The combined driveway apron from the edge of the footpath to the property boundaries has an area of approximately 60m<sup>2</sup>.

The access width is greater than 3m to a distance 7m from the carriageway and within the site, so the crossover and internal access way is appropriate and satisfies the internal access way widths in Table C2.2 of the Scheme.

While not strictly a requirement for the number of parking spaces served by this development, the existing double crossover and driveway apron allows for two-way passing traffic at the access without queuing in the site or cul-de-sac.

It is estimated that the development will create 18 vehicle movements per day, two of those being in the peak hour. Since the increase in vehicular traffic at the existing vehicle crossing will be fewer than 40 vehicle movements per day, the Acceptable Solution of C3.5.1 is met.

It is expected that up to six wheelie bins will be placed in the road reserve on any waste collection day from the proposed three multiple dwellings. Since the subject site has a narrow frontage without sufficient width for bin placement for waste collection, the additional wheelie



bins will need to rely on neighbouring frontages to find available space to place bins for collection.

The impact of the additional wheelie bins in the road reserve has been considered by assessing the existing and future demand for bin collection space, compared with the space available in the court. The Court bowl provides access and bin collection space for the following properties: 1, 2, 3, 4 & 5 Wivell Street. Assuming each property is developed, including the proposed three multiple dwellings on the subject site, space for 14 bins is required in the court bowl.

There is approximately 30m of space available in the court bowl, not including the area at the end of the cul-de-sac between the crossovers to 2 Wivell Street and the subject site. Even with a conservative assumption that each of the 14 bins will be the maximum 240L bin size, and each bin is placed with the recommended 1m spacing, 21.5m of space is required for collection. The 30m of available space is suitable for up to 19 bins, or five more than what is proposed as part of this development.

An additional 18m of space is available between the court bowl and the pedestrian access ramps, which equates to space for an additional 12 bins.

Private waste collection was considered but not preferred for this site or for this level of development. The substantial existing shared crossover and concrete apron was constructed to an urban driveway standard as part of the subdivision and is therefore not suitable for regular heavy vehicle movements such as that of a garbage truck.

The internal access driveway does not provide space for convenient internal waste collection. Based on the above assessment, external waste collection utilising Council's waste collection service is the preferred and most appropriate method.

The Road Authority has considered and assessed the proposed development with regard to site access, traffic generation and potential impacts to surrounding road users from excessive bin collection at the court bowl.

The surrounding road network can absorb the additional traffic proposed by the development. The predicted traffic movements at the existing crossover are not expected to create issues at the court bowl or surrounding road network. The court bowl offers plenty of storage for bin collection. External waste collection through Council's fortnightly collection service is considered the most appropriate solution for a development on this site.

#### STORMWATER AUTHORITY COMMENTS

The Stormwater Authority under consideration of the *Urban Drainage Act 2013* provided the following advice:

The site has an existing connection to Council's public stormwater system at the site frontage. The development will create impervious carparking areas and access ways. Stormwater runoff from these areas will be collected and drained to the site stormwater connection.

A condition has been included in the recommended conditions to ensure sediment and erosion runoff from the development site does not impact Council's road or stormwater network.



Stormwater from the proposed development is not expected to create issues or impacts to the surrounding area or Council's drainage network.

## **NOTIFICATION**

The application was notified for the required 14-day period in accordance with the Act. Full copies of the representations received during the public exhibition period were provided to the Councilors. Consideration of any representation is a requirement under both the Scheme and the Act.

The number of representations received during this time was two (2).

ISSUE 1	Traffic Flow in Wivell Street will increase. The court is used by children for recreational purposes.
ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	The proposed development is expected to generate around 18 traffic movements per day, with 2 at peak hour. Any development on the currently vacant lot would increase traffic in the cul-de-sac. For example, a single dwelling would be expected to produce up to 10 traffic movements per day.  The proposal meets the Acceptable Solution for generation of traffic using
	an existing vehicle access under the Road and Railway Assets Code, which is no more than 40 trips per day.
	The vehicle access and parking areas within the site meet the requirements of the Parking and Access Code, including allowing vehicles to turn onsite and leave in a forward direction.
	Overall, the proposed development has been appropriately designed to allow for safe traffic and pedestrian movements to and from the site.
ISSUE 2	No off-street parking in Wivell Street for the site. Traffic and parking congestion will increase. Construction vehicles and excess visitor parking will hinder use of Wivell Street and prevent trucks turning in the cul de sac.
ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	The proposed development provides a compliant level of car parking on the site, with 2 dedicated spaces for each dwelling and a visitor parking space.
	It is not anticipated that the proposed development will generate a large need for on-street parking.
	If and when on-street parking does occur, it is the responsibility of drivers to park in a legal and safe manner.
ISSUE 3	Direct access to the Bindaree Road bus stop will be cut off and there is no pedestrian access lane provided.
ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	It is understood that residents have enjoyed a direct pedestrian route across the site to access the bus stop, which will no longer be available with the development of 1 Wivell Street.
	1 Wivell Street is private land intended for residential development and there are no public access rights over this land. The proponent is not responsible for the original subdivision design not including a public pedestrian thoroughfare.



	The bus stop will still be within 400-500m walk for many of the properties in the subdivision.

ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS	Council's Engineer has advised that the existing crossover is a shared crossover with the neighbouring 3 Wivell Street. It has a width of approximately 6m, with a driveway apron to each property boundary, approximately 11m from the carriageway to the subject site.					
	The internal access is no less than 3m wide, which complies with the planning scheme requirements for a development of this size. If necessary, it is expected that emergency vehicles will be able to enter the site.					
ISSUE 6	No soil report/landslip assessment in Planning application.

# ASSESSING OFFICER'S COMMENTS

The proposal is for three small, two-bedroom dwellings only. The use is residential in nature, and the expected level of traffic will be low at around 18 vehicle trips per day.

While the level of activity and noise will certainly be greater than the current vacant lot, the proposal is not expected to significantly change or reduce the residential amenity of the area.

#### **OPTIONS**

The Planning Authority may approve (with or without conditions) or refuse the application, based on its assessment against the Scheme and any representations that were received.

A recommendation for approval is provided with conditions. Any alternative recommendation/s requires justification with relevant planning reasons.

## PROFESSIONAL COMMENTS OF THE ASSESSING OFFICER

The assessing officer has evaluated the proposal and is satisfied the proposal meets the relevant acceptable solutions and demonstrates compliance with the performance criteria for the requested discretions.

The matters raised by the representors have been considered but do not impact the assessment of the application and the officer's recommendation.

The proposed development complies with all relevant Performance Criteria, and conditions have been drafted to ensure that the development proceeds in a suitable manner. As such, the proposal is recommended for approval.

#### RECOMMENDATION

That application PA2025260 be determined as follows:

- (a) the requested variations comply with the relevant performance criteria and be supported;
- (b) matters raised by the representor have been considered but do not alter the assessment against the Scheme or the recommendation; and

That the application for Residential – Multiple Dwellings (3 dwellings) by Nova Land Consulting, for land at 1 Wivell Street, Legana Lot No. 77 on Plan No. 180377 be **APPROVED** subject to the following conditions:

2. Prior to the commencement of the use, the private and public infrastructure works must be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications approved by the Council. The required infrastructure works must be as shown in the application documents and endorsed plans or as modified by the approvals of the Road & Stormwater Authorities.

#### SOIL AND WATER MANAGEMENT CONTROL PLAN

- 3. Prior to the commencement of any works on site (including vegetation removal), a site management plan must be submitted detailing how soil and water is to be managed on the site during the construction process to prevent the escape of soil and sediments beyond site boundaries. This plan must clearly set out the property owner's obligations for erection, inspection and maintenance of all control measures approved. The management plan must include the following:
  - (a) Date and author;
  - (b) Property boundaries, location of adjoining roads, impervious surfaces, underground services and existing drainage, contours, approximate grades of slope, directions of fall, north point and scale;
  - (c) General soil description;
  - (d) Location and types of all existing natural vegetation, location and amount of the proposed ground disturbance, the limit of clearing, grading and filling and the proposed location of soil, sand, topsoil and other material stockpiles.
  - (e) Critical natural areas such as drainage lines, cliffs, wetlands and unstable ground;
  - (f) Location of vegetation to be retained and removed;
  - (g) Location of stabilised site access;
  - (h) Initial and final contours, location of watercourses, surface drainage and existing stormwater infrastructure;
  - (i) Stormwater discharge point, if proposed;
  - (j) Location of all proposed temporary drainage control measures;
  - (k) Construction details buildings or subdivision;
  - (I) Location and details of all proposed erosion control measures;
  - (m) Location and details of the measures to minimise dust escaping from the site;
  - (n) Location and details of all proposed sediment control measures:
  - (o) A statement of who is responsible for establishing and maintaining erosion and sediment control measures;
  - (p) Site rehabilitation or revegetation/landscaping program;
  - (q) The estimated dates for the start and finish of the works including the installation sequence of the different erosion and sediment controls;
  - (r) Any information required to address soil, water and dust control measures required to accommodate staging of the proposal;
  - (s) Outline of the maintenance program for the erosion and sediment controls; this must include a weekly inspection as well as before and after every rain event and a reporting schedule to council.
- 4. Works must not commence prior to the approval of the Soil and Water Management Control Plan by the Director of Community Assets. The approved Plan must be implemented with the commencement of works on site and maintained during construction to ensure that soil erosion and dust are appropriately managed to reasonably maintain amenity of adjoining and nearby properties. A copy of the approved Soil and Water Management Plan must be on the site at all times. All on ground workers must be aware of and understand the plan.

#### **COMMENCED DEVELOPMENT STOP**

5. Where development has commenced on site and then stops for two weeks or more, interim stormwater, erosion and dust control measures must:



- (a) be installed and maintained on site to the satisfaction of the Director of Community Assets:
- (b) Ensure that overland flows do not become a nuisance to adjoining properties or council's infrastructure;
- (c) be maintained until work recommences on site; and
- (d) include a weekly inspection as well as before and after every rain event and a reporting schedule to council. Measures under this condition may require a revised Soil and Water Management Control Plan to be approved for the site.

#### **TASWATER**

6. The development must be in accordance with the Submission to Planning Authority Notice issued by TasWater TWDA 2025/01012-WTC attached.

#### **TASNETWORKS**

7. The development must act in accordance with the instructions provided by TasNetworks regarding the removal and installation of electrical assets on the site.

#### **VISITOR PARKING FOR MULTIPLE DWELLINGS**

8. Prior to the commencement of the use, the visitor parking on common property must be constructed in accordance with the endorsed plans and clearly delineated for general use through signage or other physical means.

## STAGED MULTIPLE DWELLINGS

- 9. Where development is to be staged, the following works must be completed prior to sealing of the strata plan:
  - (a) Common property all common property proposed in the strata plan must be completed, including construction of driveway, parking and access areas, landscaping, mailboxes, bin storage areas and utilities connections;
  - (b) Each strata lot for developed individual strata lots containing a building, all building works, landscaping, utilities connections, parking and driveways must be completed; and Each strata lot for vacant individual strata lots or any balance lot for future strata division, access and utilities connections (including provision for future lots within a balance lot) must be completed prior to sealing of the staged strata plan.

# **Permit Notes**

- A. This permit was issued based on the proposal documents submitted for PA2025260. You should contact Council with any other use or developments, as they may require the separate approval of Council.
- B. This permit take effect after:
  - (a) The 14 day appeal period expires; or

#### **SUMMARY**

This report is provided to Council for their consideration to appoint two officers of Council as Acting Chief Executive Officer in the case of absence of the Chief Executive Officer and in accordance with the requirements of Section 61B of the *Local Government Act 1993* (**the Act**).

For the avoidance of doubt, "Chief Executive Officer" means General Manager for the purposes of the Act and all other legislation administered by or concerning Council.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Section 61B of the Act provides for the Council to appoint a person to act in the office of Chief Executive Officer (**CEO**) during every absence of the CEO for a term not exceeding 5 years.

Pursuant to Minute 25/3, Council appointed Michelle Riley, Director Planning & Development, as Acting CEO for the period 21 January to 31 December 2025, inclusive. Minute 25/3 also appointed Dino de Paoli, Director Community Assets to be Acting CEO for the same period in the instance of both Kristen Desmond and Michelle Riley being absent.

The CEO has periods of planned annual leave scheduled at various times throughout 2026 and an Acting CEO is required to be appointed to cover these periods. It is also prudent to have a standing Acting CEO in order to cover any instances of unplanned leave.

The appointment of an alternate Acting CEO is seen as a prudent way of mitigating the risk of the appointed Acting CEO being unavailable in the CEO's absence.

  - b. the general manager is absent and the person appointed under subsection (4) is absent from duty or otherwise unavailable or unable to act in the office of general manager.
- 3. An appointment under subsection (2) ends when the first of the following occurs:
  - a. the general manager returns to duty;
  - b. the term of the appointment expires;
  - c. the mayor or the council revokes the appointment;
  - d. a person is appointed as general manager under section 61.
- 4. The council may appoint a person to act in the office of general manager during every absence of the general manager.
- 5. An appointment under subsection (4) is for the term, not exceeding 5 years, specified in the appointment and ends when the first of the following occurs:
  - a. the term of the appointment expires;
  - b. the council revokes the appointment;
  - c. if the appointment is to the holder of an office, the person ceases to hold that office.
- 6. While a person appointed to act in the office of general manager is acting as general manager, that person is taken to be the general manager.

#### **RISK CONSIDERATIONS**

The appointments of an Acting CEO and an alternate Acting CEO are designed to minimise the risk to the organisation. The recommendation also provides transparency to the Councillors and the community.

It is proposed that Dino De Paoli, Director Community Assets, be appointed as Acting Chief Executive Officer with Michelle Riley, Director Planning & Development as the alternate for 2026 calendar year.

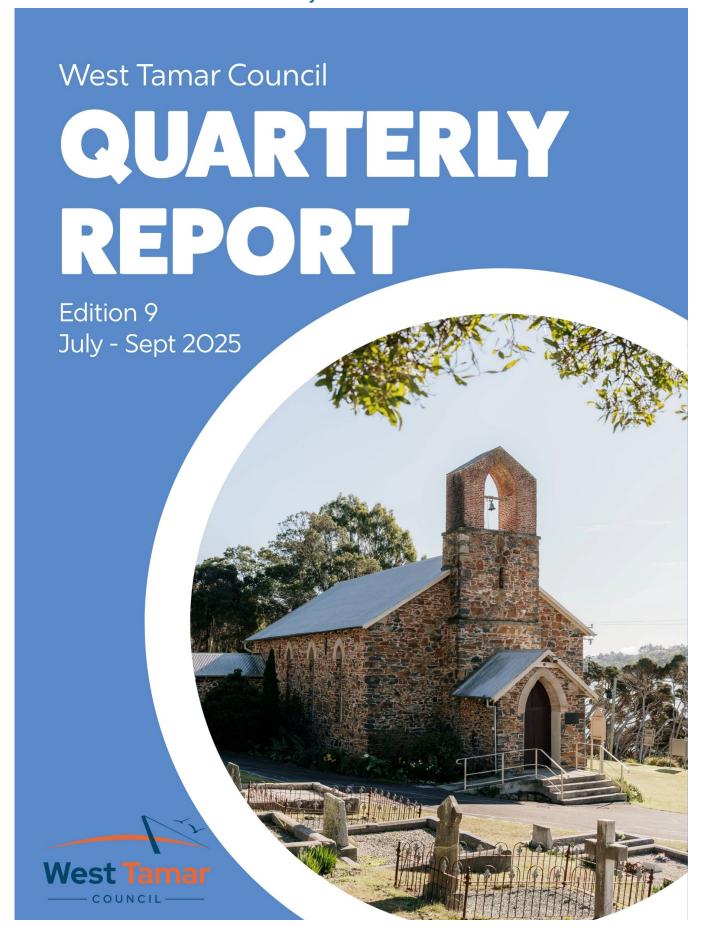

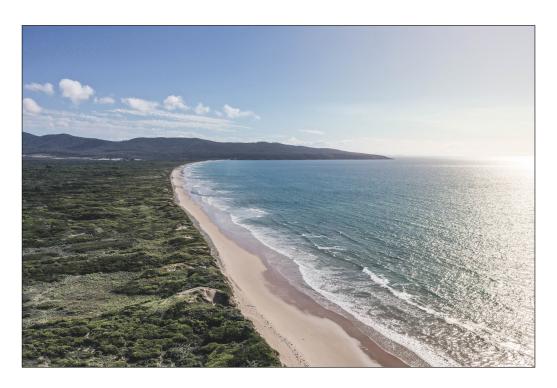

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# Message from the CEO

I am pleased to share with you the highlights from first quarter of the 2025-26 financial year.

This new quarter for the financial year has been marked by significant progress and achievements right across our organisation.

From a financial perspective, Council remains - as always - in a strong position, particularly from a cash perspective, fuelled by rates income and higher than expected Commonwealth financial assistance grants payments.

The percentage of rates payments outstanding is higher than the norm - most likely an indicator of ongoing cost-of-living pressures being felt in our communities.

Our compliance levels for our Customer Service Requests remain impressively high at almost 98.4 per cent, which is a testament to the diligence and commitment of our officers to serving our residents.

One surprising - and very pleasing figure that came out over the first quarter was the number of successful applications for new food businesses in the West Tamar.

While there 16 approvals recorded for all of the 24/25 financial year (and just one in the previous quarter) there have been 11 food business applications in the July to September quarter, which just underpins all the work we do to promote our beautiful Tamar region as a world-class food and wine experience.

A new addition to our Quarterly Reporting from this edition is our facility bookings, which showcases the popularity our many community facilities spread across the region. This includes the ever-busy Windsor Community Centre, the Tamar Function Centre, our recently upgraded Indoor Training Centre at Riverside, the new-look Windsor Oval and the two Olympic soccer grounds, through to our community halls and function spaces such as Legana Hall, the Exeter Community Hub and the Rowella Hall.

The historic Beaconsfield Mine & Heritage Centre continues to perform at a high level as a drawcard for tourists across the region – registering a noticeable spike in patronage with more than 2150 visitors in September, up from just over 1600 in August.

As always, I would like to again thank Council staff for their continued dedication and hard work and I look forward to reporting on what I am sure will be a very busy second quarter in the lead-up to the Christmas and New Year period.

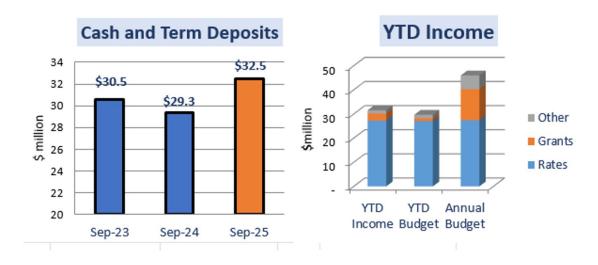

Rates income is exceeding the quarter's expectations driven from greater supplementary rating than budgeted.

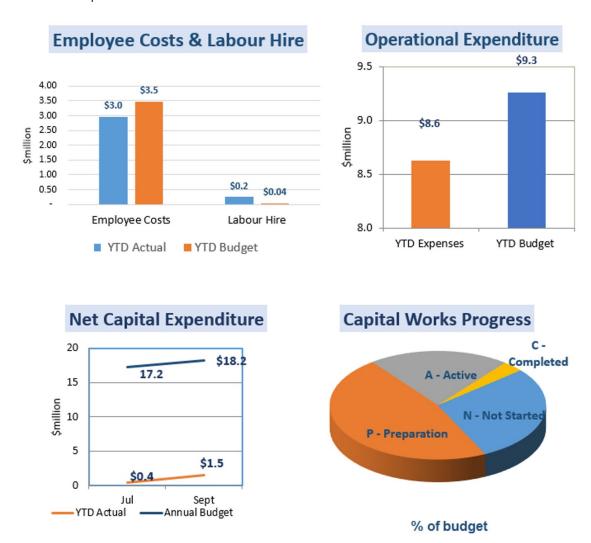




Rates outstanding as a % raised has increased and may indicate the changing economic pressures at the moment. Results will continue to be closely monitored.

# **Key Project Update**

#### **BEAUTY POINT FORESHORE REDEVELOPMENT**

After almost two years of civil works, work on the Beauty Point Foreshore Redevelopment has finally been completed.

This generational project - which was funded by a \$3 million grant from the Federal Government - has transformed the iconic waterfront into a vibrant, accessible destination for residents and visitors alike.



The redevelopment, which was guided by the Beauty Point Foreshore Master Plan, delivers enhanced public access to the Tamar River estuary, upgraded amenities, and a renewed focus on the area's natural and cultural heritage.

The Plan provided a future direction for the foreshore that benefitted the community by providing better access to the foreshore and connection to the town and upgraded amenities, while enhancing the natural and cultural assets of the area and making it attractive to both locals and visitors alike.

#### Key features include:

- A continuous foreshore trail that connects a series of nodes and passive recreation activities
- Formalised locations to access the water's edge
- A new and innovative coastal foreshore playground with accessibility features which additional funding contributed by the local Lions and Rotary clubs and I warmly thank them for their support)
- Barbecue shelters, seating and picnic tables
- Formalised car parking areas at key locations, and
- Landscape amenity and beautification, and
- Refreshed public spaces that better integrate with local attractions like Seahorse World and Platypus House.

Developed in partnership with TasPorts and Tourism Northern Tasmania, the project builds on \$3 million in Federal Government funding, to create a sustainable hub that supports tourism, recreation, and community well-being.

The initiative addresses longstanding community priorities, including better foreshore connectivity and enhanced safety and usability of public facilities.

West Tamar Council Mayor Christina Holmdahl said that the Beauty Point Foreshore redevelopment was more than just barbecue shelters and new pathways.

"In reality, it's a testament to our community's vision and resilience," Mayor Holmdahl said.



"For years, Beauty Point residents have championed better access to our stunning foreshore, and today we celebrate that dream becoming reality.

"This space will foster connection to our Tamar River heritage, boost local tourism, and provide joyful, inclusive places for play and relaxation.

"The West Tamar Council is immensely proud of this remarkable facility, which we believe will serve as a vibrant centrepiece for our community for generations to come," Mayor Holmdahl said.

One of the final aspects of the redevelopment - a purpose-built, DDA compliant ramp - provides easy access from the redevelopment section of the foreshore to the beach below.

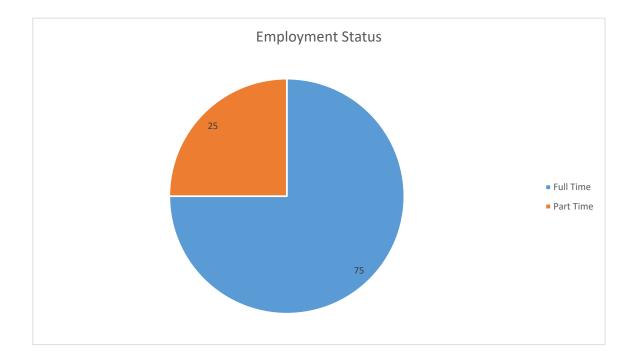
## Workforce

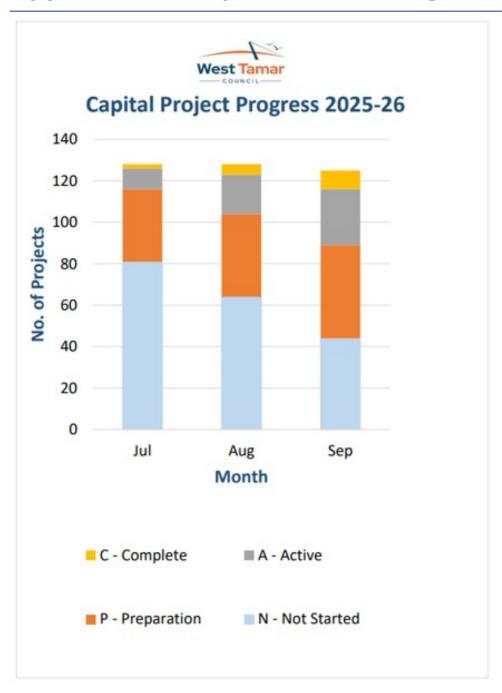

On behalf of West Tamar Council, I write to express Council's support for TasWater's infrastructure upgrade plans - specifically the commencement of the Ti-Tree Bend sewage treatment plant - proposed in its Price and Services Plan 5 (PSP5) for the regulatory period 2026–2030.

Council understands the challenges associated with balancing affordability for customers with the need to invest in essential infrastructure. Whilst Council does not necessarily agree with the proposed changes to TasWater pricing as set out in its PSP5 submission, it is Council's view that the infrastructure upgrades proposed are critical to our municipality.

TasWater's plan outlines significant investment in upgrading ageing infrastructure, improving service reliability, and meeting environmental obligations. These improvements are critical to supporting population growth, protecting public health, and ensuring sustainable water services for generations to come in the West Tamar municipality.

West Tamar Council are working with TasWater and continue to lobby TasWater, State and Federal Governments for appropriate funding for sewerage infrastructure improvements for the Legana area. Council is pleased to see that these critical works have been included in the PSP5.

As can be seen below, part of TasWater's PSP5 submission set out the current level of non-compliance with wastewater parameters at the Legana Sewage Treatment Plant (STP). Council considers this non-compliance as significant and something that needs to be addressed as a matter of urgency.

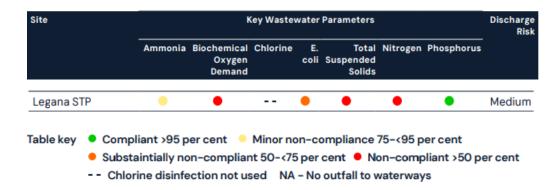






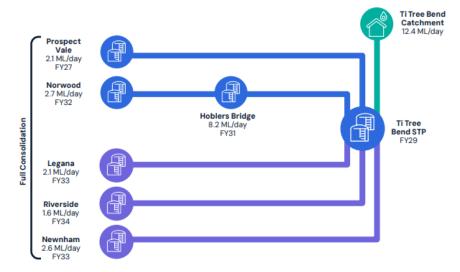

### **SUMMARY**

The purpose of this report is to seek Council approval of a new Council Meeting Engagement Policy and the rescinding of Council's existing Public Question Time Policy, which this new policy is intended to replace.

#### **BACKGROUND**

WT-HRM51.00 Public Question Time Policy was last updated in November 2023 (127/23), with the Council meeting report referring to public feedback in relation to the inclusion of statements.

The Local Government (Meeting Procedures) Regulations 2025 (the Regulations) (made 26 May 2025) have also expanded regulations and added new regulations, covering topics such as the explicit power given to the Chief Executive Officer to refuse to list a question on the agenda for various reasons.

The Regulations, as written, are not applicable to Annual General Meetings, so the scope of the policy has been expanded to provide some guidance as to the behavioural expectations and requirements of members of the public when attending an Annual General Meeting in accordance with the requirements of the *Local Government Act 1993*.

#### 1 PURPOSE

The purpose of this Policy is to outline the procedures for contributions from members of the public and Councillors at West Tamar Council (**Council**) meetings including Ordinary Council Meetings, Special Council Meetings, Annual General Meetings and Council Committee Meetings. This aims to ensure a fair, efficient, and transparent process for members of the public and Councillors to ask relevant questions about the activities of Council in line with the requirements of the Local Government (Meeting Procedures) Regulations 2025 (the Regulations).

#### 2 SCOPE

This policy applies to statements, questions on notice, questions without notice and behaviour from members of the public and Councillors at all Ordinary Council Meetings, Annual General Meetings, Special Council Meetings and Council Committee Meetings held by Council. Additionally, motions moved by members of the public, either provided on notice prior to or without notice, at Annual General Meetings are within the scope of this policy.

#### 3 DEFINITIONS

- Chairperson: The person chairing the Council Meeting, typically the Mayor or Deputy Mayor.
- Chief Executive Officer: A term of reference for the General Manager as appointed by Council pursuant to section 61 of the Local Government Act 1993 (Tas). For the avoidance of doubt, Chief Executive Officer means General Manager for the purposes of the Local Government Act 1993 (Tas) and all other legislation administered by or concerning Council.
- Councillor: An elected member of Council.
- Member of the public: Any person who is not acting in an official capacity as a councillor, council employee, or appointed agent of the council.
- Question on Notice: A written question submitted to the Chief Executive Officer at least seven (7) clear days prior to the meeting.

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 Question Without Notice: A question asked in-person at a Council Meeting without prior written notice.

#### **4 POLICY STATEMENT**

Council is committed to providing a transparent and accessible forum for community engagement through its meetings. This policy provides a framework for managing the various forms of input during Council Meetings, from both members of the public and Councillors. It aims to ensure that questions and statements are received and addressed in a manner that is fair, consistent, and respectful, balancing community participation with the efficient conduct of Council business.

#### 4.1 BEHAVIOURAL EXPECTATIONS

The Council chamber is a formal workplace for elected members and staff. To ensure the professional and effective conduct of Council business, and to meet legal obligations for a safe work environment, all attendees are required to observe standards of decorum and respect. These behavioural expectations apply equally to all Councillors, staff, and members of the public present.

If a member of the public:

- (a) Hinders or disrupts, or tries to hinder or disrupt, a meeting, including the use of language or behaviour that is reasonably perceived to be obscene or offensive, or
- (b) fails to leave a closed meeting

the chairperson may take reasonable steps to remove the person from the meeting, including requesting the assistance of a police officer.

Additionally, the following behavioural expectations are required to be signed, acknowledged and agreed to, by all members of the public prior to being granted entry to the Council chamber. These expectations are not exhaustive; any behaviour that is reasonably perceived by the Chairperson to be unacceptable is prohibited:

#### West Tamar Council Meeting – Behavioural Expectations

At any Council Meeting of West Tamar Council I will not:

- (a) refuse to follow instructions from the Chairperson, especially regarding the maintaining of decorum particularly,
- (b) exhibit behaviour or language reasonably perceived by the Chairperson as threatening, aggressive, inflammatory, defamatory, abusive, or generally objectionable in nature,
- (c) ask questions that are trivial, repetitive (having already been answered), or designed to annoy (being vexatious),
- (d) seek to discuss the personal views of Councillors or staff, legal matters, or topics that have a reasonable potential to be prejudicial to Council,

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- (e) attempt to distract others or unduly draw attention to oneself while others are speaking,
- (f) audibly interject, heckle, applaud, boo, or create any other form of disruptive reaction to the proceedings,
- (g) engage with Councillors or staff at any time other than the designated Public Input Time or when invited to make a submission
- (h) use a mobile phone or other electronic device in a manner that causes a disruption,
- (i) make any audio or visual recording (including photographs) of the meeting without the prior and express permission of the Chairperson,
- (j) display or distribute any placard, banner, sign, pamphlet, or other material within the meeting room without the prior and express permission of the Chairperson,
- (k) exceed the specific time limit allocated for speaking, as directed by the Chairperson, or
- (I) behave in any other way that is reasonably perceived by the Chairperson to be unacceptable, or that contravenes the Local Government Meeting Regulations 2025 or any other relevant legislation or policy of West Tamar Council.

#### 4.2 PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

Collectively, with responses to public questions provided and taken on notice, this portion of the meeting shall be referred to as Public Question Time.

Public Question Time is not a platform for:

- (a) debating issues, including with Councillors, staff, or other members of the public,
- (b) making submissions, or
- (c) making statements or asking questions that:
  - a. do not relate to the activities of Council.
  - b. relate to activities that are beyond Council's control,
  - c. relate to confidential, personnel, or legal matters.

#### 4.2.1 Public Questions on Notice

A member of the public may submit up to three (3) written questions to the Chief Executive Officer to be answered at the next Ordinary Council Meeting.

Questions on notice that comply with this policy or the Regulations, along with the response prepared by the Chief Executive Officer, shall be published in the agenda for the relevant Ordinary Council Meeting.

Where questions are not compliant with this policy or the Regulations, the Chief Executive Officer shall advise the member of the public of this and provide reasons as to why the questions are not compliant.

Whilst not explicitly applicable to Annual General Meetings, it is a requirement of this policy for public questions on notice at an Annual General Meeting to be aligned with relevant requirements of Regulation 38 of the Regulations, namely that:

- (a) a member of the public may, at least 7 days before an Annual General Meeting, give written notice to the Chief Executive Officer of a question to which the member of the public seeks an answer at the meeting, and
- (b) a public question on notice must relate to the activities of the council.

#### 4.2.2 PUBLIC QUESTIONS WITHOUT NOTICE

During Public Question Time, the Chairperson shall invite members of the public who have indicated that they wish to make a statement and/or ask questions to do so.

Questions and statements must comply with the requirements of this policy.

A member of the public wishing to ask a question or make a statement must, when invited by the Chairperson, stand and clearly state their name and their suburb of residence before asking their question.

- All questions must be addressed to the Chairperson.
- In accordance with Regulation 36(2) of the Regulations, a question asked by a member of the public and the answer given are not to be debated.
- A person asking a question or making a statement without notice must be
  physically present to ask their question. A question or statement may not be
  read on another person's behalf unless in exceptional circumstances and
  prior agreement has been sought and obtained from the Chairperson.

Members of the public are allowed up to one (1) statement and/or up to three (3) questions, with a maximum of five (5) minutes for the making of a statement or for all questions to be asked. For clarity, a member of the public has a maximum of five (5) minutes total irrespective of making a statement, asking questions, or a combination thereof.

Multi-part questions are taken to be separate questions. That is a question with parts (a), (b) and (c) will be considered to be three (3) questions.

Whilst not explicitly applicable to Annual General Meetings, it is a requirement of this policy for public questions without notice at an Annual General Meeting to be aligned with relevant requirements of Regulation 37 of the Regulations, namely that:

- (a) a member of the public may, on invitation by the chairperson of an Annual General Meeting, ask a question without notice at the meeting, and
- (b) a public question without notice must relate to the activities of the council.

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#### 4.3 COUNCILLOR'S QUESTIONS WITH OR WITHOUT NOTICE

Collectively, with responses to councillor questions provided and taken on notice, this portion of the meeting shall be referred to as Councillors Questions With or Without Notice.

#### 4.3.1 COUNCILLOR'S QUESTIONS ON NOTICE

A Councillor may submit up to three (3) written questions on notice to the Chief Executive Officer to be answered at the next Ordinary Council Meeting. Multi-part questions are taken to be separate questions. That is a question with parts (a), (b) and (c) will be considered to be three (3) questions.

Questions on Notice that comply with this Policy, along with the response prepared by the Chief Executive Officer, shall be published in the agenda for the relevant Ordinary Council Meeting.

Where questions are not compliant with this policy or the Regulations, the Chief Executive Officer shall advise the Councillor of this and provide reasons as to why the questions are not compliant.

Questions on notice that a Councillor is submitting for a closed Council meeting shall be clearly marked and explicitly confirmed as such in direct correspondence with the Chief Executive Officer.

#### 4.3.2 COUNCILLORS QUESTIONS WITHOUT NOTICE

During Councillor Questions with or without Notice, the Chairperson shall invite Councillors to make statements or ask questions.

Questions and statements must comply with the requirements of this policy.

Councillors are allowed up to five (5) questions without notice with a maximum of five (5) minutes in total for questions.

#### 4.4 MOTIONS MOVED BY MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETINGS

In accordance with the Local Government Act 1993, electors of the municipal area are entitled to move motions at an Annual General Meeting.

#### 4.4.1 REQUIREMENTS FOR MOTIONS

Whilst not explicitly applicable to Annual General Meetings, it is a requirement of this policy for motions moved at an Annual General Meeting to be aligned with relevant requirements of Regulation 18 of the Regulations, namely that:

- (a) The chairperson of a meeting is not to allow a motion to be debated or otherwise dealt with unless it has been moved by one member of the public and seconded by another member of the public or a Councillor,
- (b) If a member of the public, who has given notice of a motion that has not been refused does not move the motion at the meeting, the motion lapses, and
- (c) The chairperson of a meeting may refuse to accept a motion if, in the opinion of both the chairperson and the Chief Executive Officer, the motion:

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- a. is defamatory; or
- b. contains offensive language; or
- c. is unlawful; or
- d. does not relate to the activities, or functions, of the council.

#### **4.4.2** CONDUCT

Any member of the public moving a motion, or speaking to a motion, must strictly adhere to the Behavioural Expectations detailed in Section 4.1 of this Policy.

#### 4.4.3 REFUSAL OF MOTIONS

The Chairperson may refuse to accept a motion from a member of the public if it does not comply with the requirements of Section 4.4.1 of this Policy or if the person moving the motion fails to adhere to the Behavioural Expectations. The Chairperson must state the reason for any such refusal, and this reason shall be recorded in the minutes of the AGM.

#### 5 PROCEDURES

#### 5.1 COUNCIL MEETING REGISTRATION

Prior to entry to the Council chamber, members of the public are required to complete a *Council Meeting Registration and Conditions of Entry* form, providing basic information such as name and address, and acknowledging the Behavioural Expectations outlined in Section 4.1 of this Policy.

This registration form also allows for members of the public to indicate whether they would like to make a statement, ask any questions, or both. The information provided assists the Chief Executive Officer to seek clarification on or provide responses to any questions taken on notice.

#### 5.2 TIME ALLOCATION

Regulation 36 of the Regulations require the Chairperson of an ordinary council meeting to make available at least 15 minutes for questions by members of the public.

Council has determined that a period of 30 minutes total be set aside for members of the community to ask questions and make statements relating to Council activities.

If no members of the public are present for Public Question Time, or if all questions have been addressed before the time allocation has expired, the Chairperson shall declare Public Question Time closed and proceed to the next item of business.

#### 5.3 TIMEFRAMES FOR RECEIPT OF QUESTIONS ON NOTICE

In accordance with Regulations 35(1) and 38(1) of the Regulations, questions on notice must be received at least seven (7) days before a meeting to allow for research and a response to be prepared. For the avoidance of doubt, the seven (7) day period does not include the day of the meeting or the day of receipt of the question. For

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meetings held on a Tuesday, the question must be received by close of business (5pm) on the Monday of the previous week.

Receipt of a question on notice is to be acknowledged by the Chief Executive Officer, where practicable, by close of business on the following business day.

#### 5.4 ANSWERING OF QUESTIONS

The Chairperson may:

- Answer the question immediately.
- Refer the question to a Councillor or the Chief Executive Officer to answer.
- Take the question on notice.

If a question is taken on notice, a written response shall be provided to the person who asked the question within ten (10) working days, and the question and response shall be published in the agenda for the next Ordinary Council Meeting.

Where a question on notice requires further research or consideration to answer and is subsequently not able to be answered prior to the publishing of the agenda, this is to be noted in the agenda with a researched answer to be provided at, and recorded in the minutes of, the meeting.

#### 5.5 REFUSAL OF QUESTIONS

The Chairperson in the case of a question without notice, or the Chief Executive Officer in the case of a question on notice, may refuse to accept a question in line with the requirements of Regulation 33(3) of the Regulations.

If the Chief Executive Officer refuses to accept a question on notice, they must provide the reason or reasons for doing so. Any reasons for refusal shall be recorded in the agenda and minutes of the meeting; there is no requirement to publish the refused question.

If the Chairperson refuses to accept a question without notice, they must state the reason or reasons for doing so. Any reasons for refusal shall be recorded in the minutes if the meeting; there is no requirement to publish the refused question.

#### 5.6 RECORDING OF QUESTIONS/STATEMENTS IN MINUTES

Per the requirements of WT-HRM68.00 – Audio Recording and Minutes Policy, where resourcing and an audio recording of sufficient quality allows, Council staff shall endeavour to provide an accurate transcription of the salient and most relevant points in questions and statements and their respective responses in the minutes of the meeting, however no assurance is made as to the accuracy of any transcription.

To assist in questions/statements being recorded accurately in the minutes, persons asking questions or making statements without notice are strongly encouraged to provide a written copy of their questions/statement to Council staff upon arrival at the meeting.

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#### **6 RESPONSIBILITIES**

#### 6.1 CHAIRPERSON

- To manage Public Question Time in an orderly and efficient manner,
- To determine if a question is allowable under the Regulations.
- To disallow any question that is not allowable and state the reason for doing so.
- To determine the method of answering a question.
- To ensure the answer to a question is not debated.

#### 6.2 COUNCILLOR

- To comply with the procedures outlined in this policy when asking questions or making statements during Councillor Questions with or without Notice.
- To comply with the requirements of WT-HRM72.00 Elected Members Work Health Safety Policy.
- To accept the Chairperson's decision on whether a question is allowed or how it will be answered.

#### 6.3 CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

- To acknowledge receipt of and answer Questions on Notice.
- To ensure compliant Questions on Notice and their prepared responses are included in the meeting agenda.
- To ensure all questions, statements, and any responses are recorded in the minutes.
- To provide written responses for questions taken on notice within ten (10) working days.

#### 6.4 MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC

- To comply with the procedures outlined in this policy.
- To clearly state their name and suburb of residence when invited to ask a question.
- To accept the Chairperson's decision on whether a question is allowed or how it will be answered.

#### 1 ESTABLISHMENT

The Positive Ageing Committee (**the Committee**) is established by the West Tamar Council (**Council**) as a Special Committee of Council under Section 24 of the Local Government Act 1993.

#### 2 PURPOSE

The primary purpose of the Committee is to assist and advise Council in:

- The implementation, monitoring, and review of Council's Positive Ageing Strategy.
- Identifying and responding to the needs, interests, and priorities of older residents within the West Tamar municipal area.
- Promoting an age-friendly community that supports older people to live active, healthy, respected, and engaged lives.

#### 3 OBJECTIVES

The specific objectives of the Committee are to:

- Provide strategic advice and recommendations to Council on policies, strategies, services, and infrastructure that impact older residents.
- Act as a key consultation body for Council on matters relating to positive ageing and age-friendly principles.
- Identify and advise Council on emerging issues, trends, and barriers affecting the well-being and participation of older people in the community.
- Advocate to Council for initiatives that enhance the quality of life, health, and inclusion of older residents.
- Foster partnerships and facilitate communication between Council, service providers, community groups, and older residents.
- Promote a positive and respectful image of ageing within the West Tamar community.

Positive Ageing Committee (PAC) – Terms of Reference

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 Assist Council in monitoring the effectiveness of its Positive Ageing Strategy and recommend updates as required.

#### 4 MEMBERSHIP

#### 4.1 COMPOSITION

The Committee shall consist of:

- Two (2) Councillors, appointed by Council.
- Up to eight (8) community members who are residents of the West Tamar municipal area and represent the interests of older people, local service providers, or relevant community organisations.
- The Council's Community Development Officer (or other nominated officer)
  as an ex-officio, non-voting member providing administrative and
  secretariat support.

#### 4.2 APPOINTMENT

Appointments to the Committee will be in accordance with the following:

- Councillor members will be appointed by Council for a term of two (2) years concurrent with their term of office or as otherwise determined by Council.
- Community members will be appointed by Council, following a public expression of interest process, for a term of two (2) years, with the option of reappointment for one further term to ensure rotation of membership.

#### 4.3 CHAIRPERSON AND DEPUTY CHAIRPERSON

The committee shall appoint a community committee member as Chairperson, and Council shall appoint a Councillor committee member as Deputy Chairperson, at the commencement of each term.

In the absence of the appointed Chairperson, the Deputy Chairperson shall preside over the meeting. Where neither the Chairperson nor the Deputy Chairperson is present, another committee member shall be appointed to preside over the meeting.

#### 4.4 POSITIONS BECOMING VACANT

In the event of the position of Chairperson becoming vacant, the committee shall appoint a community committee member as the new Chairperson at the next committee meeting.

In the event of the position of Deputy Chairperson becoming vacant, Council shall appoint one of the councillor committee members as the new Deputy Chairperson at the next ordinary Council meeting.

#### 4.5 ABANDONMENT OF POSITION

Where a committee member is absent from three (3) consecutive meetings, or from three (3) of the most recent six (6) meetings, without having been granted a Leave or

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Leaves of Absence, the position will become vacant and a new committee member shall be appointed. If required, a new Chairperson or Deputy Chairperson will be appointed.

#### 5 REPORTING

The Committee is an advisory body and reports directly to the West Tamar Council.

Minutes of each Committee meeting, along with any recommendations, shall be presented to the next available ordinary meeting of Council for consideration and noting.

The Committee has no authority to act or speak on behalf of Council unless explicitly authorised by a Council resolution.

#### 6 ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT

Council shall provide appropriate administrative and secretariat support to the Committee, including the preparation of agendas, distribution of papers, taking of minutes, and maintenance of records.

#### 7 FINANCIAL DELEGATION

The Committee has no delegated financial or operational authority from Council.

The Council officer appointed to provide administrative and secretariat support may incur minimal expenditure for the administrative operation of the Committee in accordance with the officer's approved purchasing authority and budget availability.

#### 8 REVIEW OF TERMS OF REFERENCE

These Terms of Reference shall be reviewed by the Committee and Council at least once every two (2) years, or following each ordinary Council election, to ensure they remain relevant and effective.

#### 9 DISSOLUTION

The Committee may be dissolved at any time by a resolution of the Council.

#### **SUMMARY**

An upgrade of the BMHC CCTV system has recently been completed by Council's Security contractor. Cost of works for updating came in at \$11k leaving unspent funding of \$19k from the \$30k budget.

A similar budget of \$30k has been allocated to upgrade the CCTV system at WCP. This is a much larger and more complex system. Quotes to upgrade the CCTV are in the process of being sourced with one quote already received indicating like for like replacement will be in the vicinity of \$40k. Increasing the available budget to \$49k is expected to allow for the installation of additional higher quality, cameras that will provide a better overview of the outside areas around the precinct.

It was recommended that the CEO approve a transfer of \$19,000 in funding as detailed above, to enable a better project outcome that will benefit the safety of users of the precinct.

#### **SUMMARY**

The purpose of this report is to seek Council's approval for the inclusion of an additional \$7,000 for the purchase and installation of an audio visual system for Winkleigh Hall to the 2025-2026 Capital Works estimates and a related \$7,000 reduction to an existing capital works project.

While Council has delegated authority to the CEO to approve adjustments to capital works project budgets, this does not include the addition of new projects. An adjustment to the approved capital works estimates requires the support of an absolute majority of Council.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Winkleigh Hall is a council-owned hall under the day-to-day management of a Special Committee of Council. The committee have recently notified Council of the hall's 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2026 and are seeking Council's support to recognise this milestone event.

A specific request is for the installation of audio-visual equipment to enable them to showcase the history of the hall at a special event to commemorate the anniversary. The equipment would then be available for future events at the hall.

Recent dealings with another group suggest an estimated cost in the vicinity of \$5,000 would provide the required equipment. A contingency amount of \$2,000 in case of additional installation costs should also be considered. This cost exceeds Council's capitalization threshold. Therefore, if the project was approved it would need to be recognised in the capital works budget.

As a way of funding this project from within the existing estimates, there is an option to transfer unused funds from a project at the Clarence Point Hall. An upgrade of the Clarence Point Hall heating system is due to be completed this week with the installation of 2 new heat pumps costing approximately \$13,000, leaving unexpended funding of \$7,000 from the \$20,000 budget.

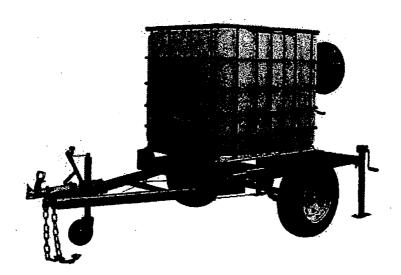

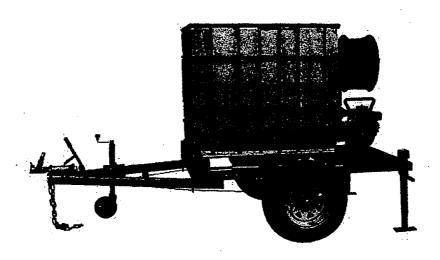

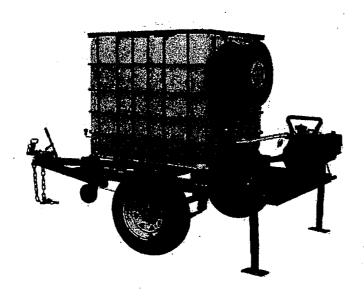

#### **MOTION**

That Council:

- 1. Engage a qualified engineer or drainage expert to prepare a stormwater drainage report and cost estimate for Little Swan Point Road where the culvert near Teggs Road is too high to allow a drainage channel for backlog of stormwater lying behind it.
- 2. Make costing and feasibility assessment of providing a covered stormwater drainage channel for 20m either side of the culvert (eastern end of Little Swan Point Road).
- 3. Requests that the report provide recommendations for improved stormwater drainage and safety measures given the assessment findings.
- 4. Receives the report at a future Council meeting, with the findings and recommended actions presented for Council's consideration.

#### **Rationale**

Whenever it rains, excess stormwater accumulates around the drainage easement of the property 424 Gravelly Beach Road which cannot escape via a nearby road culvert under Little Swan Point Road since the main culvert beside Teggs Road is too high to do so.

Whenever it rains, excess stormwater accumulates in swamp-like conditions on the property opposite 424 Gravelly Beach Road since the Little Swan Point Road open roadside drains are inadequate, being without downward slope nor well positioned culvert drain for ground-water to escape.

#### 16.1.2 Motion - Cr Sladden

#### **MOTION**

Moved: Cr Julie Sladden

That Council:

Request the CEO to investigate and prepare a report, including design options and costings, for repurposing the vacant corner block on Eden Street into a small, fenced dog park, with a view to including the project in the 2026–27 budget if supported by Council.

#### **Background**

The small corner block of land on Eden Street, once the site of a playground, is currently an unused and unmaintained grassed area. The playground was relocated to the opposite side of the road several years ago for safety reasons, leaving the fenced block vacant. Today, it remains an unkempt and underutilised space, with a small number of trees, a bench, and partial fencing but no gate or water supply.

The land is owned and managed by Council and is located in a highly visible and accessible part of the community - directly opposite the swimming pool, playground, and Council offices, and within walking distance of local shops. It sits within a mixed residential area home to many families, retirees, and dog owners.

Interestingly, after the original playground was moved, residents informally began using the site as a dog exercise area. However, after the gate was removed, this ceased. This history demonstrates a natural community preference for the space to serve local pet owners and walkers.

#### **Rationale**

Repurposing this vacant land as a small dog park would deliver multiple community benefits:

- **Amenity and Activation:** Transforming an unkempt block into an attractive, functional open space would enhance the visual appeal and liveability of the area.
- Safe Off-Leash Area: The site would provide a much-needed small, contained off-leash area for residents, especially those without large yards or transport to larger dog parks.
- **Efficient Land Use:** The project would repurpose existing Council land that currently requires maintenance but offers little community benefit.
- Community Connection: Dog parks provide social opportunities for residents, promoting both physical activity and community cohesion. This motion relates to pillar one and pillar four of the West Tamar Community Health and Wellbeing Plan.

Given the site's history, location, and existing partial infrastructure, it presents a cost-effective opportunity to deliver a high-impact local amenity.

#### 17.1 Councillors' Questions on Notice

#### **Cr Manticas**

**Question 1**: How much did it cost council for tables and chairs and covered pergola including any

site preparation costs such as concrete slabs at the dog exercise area in Beauty

Point?

Response: The cost of construction of a table, seating, shelter and site preparation costs

including a concrete slab is estimated at \$15,000, noting that there is not currently a

table at the dog exercise area in Beauty Point.

**Question 2**: Is there any money left in the budget under the Beauty Point foreshore upgrade capital

item?

Response: \$33,000 of the funds in the current year's budget allocation for the Beauty Point

foreshore upgrade remain unspent.

**Question 3**: Could you provide an update to the Storm Water Management plan for the Greens

Beach community and where this project is currently at?

**Response:** Council has received a preliminary SSMP (Stormwater Systems Management Plan)

for the Greens Beach catchments from its consultant and the Plan is under review by officers in the Community Assets team. The Plan models 1% AEP and greater storm events and considers the overland flow path issues. There will be a second phase of work for data from this modelling to be incorporated into piped system design software to assess performance of the underground network. Once work is completed, high risk issues will be identified and Council can consider what actions need to be

prioritised, and the cost and timeframes associated.

**Question 4**: In the Long Term Financial Plan for the year 2026/2027 there is \$5,000,000 dollars

budgeted to spend on Legana Recreational Developments – Can the council update the community on that capital item and confirm if that project is still on schedule for

delivery in that financial Year?

**Response:** The \$5 million figure in the Long Term Financial Plan caters for future recreational

development in Legana – the monies and extent of Legana recreational developments will alter upon more conceptual planning. The Legana Community Sport and Recreation Precinct Masterplan has not yet been finalised and, upon finalisation, the

Long Term Financial Plan will be revised in line with this.

**Question 5**: Can the council advise if there are any funding shortages associated with that capital

item?

Response: The \$5 million outlined across 2025-26 and 2026-27 financial years for Legana

recreational developments in the current Long Term Financial Plan is funded from Council operations and working capital. Until the finalisation of the Legana Community Sport and Recreation Precinct Masterplan and the Legana Structure Plan and the extent of the works is known, the estimated capital requirements and any potential

funding shortage cannot be better assessed.

Question 6: In the Long Term Financial Plan for the year across the 2030/2031 and 2031/2032

financial years there is \$17,000,000 dollars budgeted for Riverside Aquatic Centre but



slated as grant dependent, Can the council provide an update as to whether any successful grants have been obtained for this capital item?

Response:

Council's adopted Aquatic Centre Strategy is currently being reviewed by Council's Riverside Swimming Centre Redevelopment Advisory Committee. Until that work is complete no applications for grant funding will be made. Further, it should be noted that Council continues to allocate capital funding to ensure that the Riverside Pool is fit for purpose for use by West Tamar and greater Launceston residents.

**Question 7**:

Can the council provide an update as to whether the council is on track for delivering this capital item in the FY years stated in the Long Term Financial Plan along with what progress has been made to date on this capital item?

Response:

Capital maintenance works have been completed or are underway to ensure the pool remains operational until its planned renewal.

#### 17.3 Responses to Previous Questions on Notice

#### Cr Sladden

#### Question 1:

It's just regarding the augmentation of our waste recycling. And I notice that the recycle rewards program has really taken off in West Tamar. I think in July we hit over 500,000 deposits just at the Windsor one down here which has raised \$50,000 to the community, either individuals or their selected charities and they've had to put in a second one in Beaconsfield, I believe, as well. So this is obviously something that our community wants to do. When I was interstate recently, I spotted alongside regular waste bins, and I did send a picture of this to councillors, a simple basket mechanism where people could put in aluminium cans or glass bottles for other members of the community to come and collect them. Now, there may be some certain occupational health and safety things that need to be addressed here, but I thought it was such a simple idea and a way of capitalising on what we're already doing well. My question is, would it be possible for Council to look into the pricing of such an idea in the municipality and where and how that might work, just that additional waste basket for recycling alongside, especially in our high use areas, maybe Greens Beach or Beaconsfield and in and around Windsor?

#### Response:

Council officers will research options that may be suitable for a community container drop off point. However, as noted in the question, this may present safety issues to the community and Council officers due to broken glass, and along with contamination, cleaning and inspection requirements, will add to Council's operational costs. This could offset the financial benefit for potentially only a few people that may be able to collect containers from these locations. An alternate solution may be for Council to continue to raise awareness of the container deposit facilities and encouraging the community to donate containers directly to community and sporting groups.

Question 1: If I could just have a follow up on the disabled parking bays in Grubb Street,

Beaconsfield and Charles Street near the post office?

**Response**: The installation of 10 minute parking signs for one parking space in Charles Street,

Beauty Point, near the post office, will allow for people with a disability to park in that space for up to 30 minutes. The physical constraints with existing high kerb and channel in the location of the shops is not conducive to simple retrofitting of a compliant, disabled parking space. Officers have not been in a position to progress concept design or costing for a compliant space at this point in time. Officers have inspected the road reserve in Grubb Street adjacent the Neighbourhood House and are currently waiting for a supplier quote to install a pedestrian ramp on the northern side of the road. It is expected this would require capital funding. Similar to Charles Street, officers have not been in a position to progress design or costing of a compliant disability space in Grubb Street but are planning to do so to present to Council for consideration as part of upcoming capital works programs.
